HE HITS AT OUR FAULTS.
Editor El Paso Herald:
Here are a few observations made from a stay of several months in El Paso, by a veteran of the late war and a health seeker:

First—El Paso, which is a very dry town, boasts of our drinking fountain, which is in the plaza. This the caretaker leaves turned on in such a way that scarcely any water is running, and it is necessary to swallow the white bulb to get a small drink of water, which is decidedly unsanitary.

Second—The exorbitant price the laundries charge here is due to the very high wages paid the help, \$4 to \$6 per week. Also, the increased price of lumber is close to the same cause; they pay their help \$2 per day, to have a real prosperous city, it is necessary to pay living wages to labor; then the laboring man will take pride in keeping up his home and be an asset to the city. These Mexican laborers, are anything but an asset, and no pride or enterprise is shown.

If they persist in speaking Mexican and living the Mexican way, why don't they go back to Mexico where they belong?

Third—The dairy inspector must be very lax in his duties. A visit to the dairies on either side of the river in the Val Verde district would surely cure one of ever wanting to drink milk again. The high and dirty of some of these dairies is something awful.

Fourth—Nuisance out of ten men I meet are decidedly against prohibition, especially the health seeker. This will be the leading issue in next campaign. The word being quietly passed along to vote for no prohibition candidate at the next election. They put this over on us when we were away. My state voted wet, but the brilliant legislature ratifies the amendment just the same.

A good glass of beer or wine is 10 times better for one than these soft drinks and good, pure whiskey is the best of them of which I know. There is such a thing as temperance without prohibition. J. W. McKinley.

WANTS NEW COINS.
Cannulla, Tex., March 22.
Editor El Paso Herald:
Advancing the increased cost of rent and help and fixtures and all increments entering into the composition of soft drinks, we do not believe it all justifies an increase of 100 percent on 5-cent drinks.

Grocery commodities have advanced, the former popular 10-cent bottles to 12 cents or two for 25 cents, a raise of about 20 percent.

The cigar manufacturers have shown good judgment in their increase. The 5-cent cigars were about \$5 per thousand and now they must be about \$10 for the same quantity, which costs the consumer 7 cents for one cigar, a 40 percent raise.

If these necessities and luxuries have advanced to the public 40 percent, we surely can not understand why a 100 percent raise is applied to so many articles, and especially to those composed mostly of water.

In cotton goods we understand the increase, for when cotton has advanced from 4 cents a pound to 6 cents a pound, a 50 percent increase of why clothing is so high.

As far minded people we know down in our hearts that the street cars have been hard hit in these times and are justly entitled to more fare, but both political parties are afraid to tackle this question.

All the jitney chasers, merchants, utility corporations, etc., are interested in one common cause and that is how to advance the price and at the same time make the public see the justice of the demand.

Personally, I am satisfied that all should receive an increase, and only differ with some of them in the percentage now applied.

Idea of how to satisfy both consumer and dealer is for all of us to write our senators and congressmen to make a law at once to have the director of the mint make coins of the denomination of 1 cent, 2, 3 and 4 cents, thereby going away with handling more than one coin in making payments. Here in the west people have never been popular and in some places are never used.

These new coins can be made of nickel, copper, aluminum, etc., and of different sizes, so as to readily tell the amount.

The 1 and 2 cent pieces have not been used much, and I suppose the 3 and 4 cent coins would come in the same class, but I am sure 1 and 2 cent pieces would in time become our most popular coins in circulation for merchandise. W. J. Doering.


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
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
