




CARLSBAD WELL DERRICK IS UP

Carlsbad, N. M., June 14.—The derrick for Blushard No. 1 well a mile south of Carlsbad is practically complete. It is a standard 44 foot rig. Two 25 horse-power boilers are ready to be set up as soon as necessary piping is received, and a 22 ton car of steam coal is already unloaded on the site. The company plans to start in some time this month, but no date has been set. C. L. Rynd of California, a former Standard driller, is in charge of construction, and will be chief driller. He will be relieved on the second tower by Elmer Lyons, of Tulsa. R. J. McClarron and E. C. McMillan of Brockton are the tool dressers on the job. Henry D. Cane of Los Angeles is president of the drilling company, and R. H. Nix secretary and general manager. The leases were obtained from the Pool Oil and Gas company, a local concern, by which many thousands of acres of farms under the Carlsbad project are leased. The Pool Oil and Gas company plans a celebration at time of spudding it, at which time all land owners in the company will be invited to be present and see the bit bite into the earth.

Pittsburgh Man Leases Turney Land on Which Is Famous Flowing Well

Fort Stockton, Texas, June 14.—J. G. Grant, a Pittsburgh, Pa., oil man has leased 4800 acres from W. W. Turney, in block 110, about 23 miles north of Fort Stockton. It is stated that Mr. Grant will at once take steps to begin active drilling. The leasehold that he has obtained includes the famous flowing well that was drilled about 29 years ago and it is assumed that he will put it on the pump at once. James Groves, driller with the Circle Oil company, reported last week that the Circle company's hole was down 2205 feet, with the drill slowly biting through a hard sandstone formation and the cuttings showing up highly encouraging. The Pecos Valley Oil company's rig, recently bought at San Angelo, has arrived and is being trucked out to the drilling site of the company, 23 miles north of town, on block 8, section 18.

SIPE SPRINGS SHALLOW OIL FIELD EXTENDED FIVE MILES

Dallas, Texas, June 14.—The Sipe Springs shallow pool has been extended three miles south by the Sanders, et al., well, five miles south of Sipe Springs. The well is producing 50 barrels from 400 feet. Operators, hastening to the new field, plan big development. The Magnolia Petroleum company is the owner of Texas' newest and biggest producer—the J. W. Casata No. 1, flowing 5000 barrels. The well is near Deardemont. It is producing from 2716 feet. The Magnolia now has seven good wells in the vicinity of the new well. The Santa Anna Chief well on the Kingsberry farm, seven miles east of Santa Anna, Coleman county, is flowing by heads. The wells was shut down 69 days ago when it was drilled into the sand and did not produce. Three more wells will be drilled in the vicinity of the new well. Fuller No. 2, three miles southeast of Santa Anna, drilled by the Gladys Belle Oil company, just struck oil and gas at 1605 feet. Leasing has been stimulated by an oil and gas strike at 5330 feet in the Lindale Oil and Development company's well near Tyler, in east Texas.

NEW COMPANY TO DRILL

Yuma, Ariz., June 14.—Harry C. Westover and James K. Stewart are at the head of the Arizona Gas and Oil company, locally organized to sink a well in the Mohawk section, on the Gila, east of Yuma. This is an entirely new field, though a dozen years ago there was a start upon drilling north of Agua Caliente by a company of which "Buffalo Bill" Cody was the head.

SIGNS DRILLING CONTRACT

Tucson, Ariz., June 14.—The Arizona-Burk Oil company, a Tucson corporation, has signed a \$16,000 drilling contract for the exploration of a tract owned by the company in southern Oklahoma. The Moreland Oil company, organized by mining men of Moreland, Ariz., has started a well on its property in the Torah, Texas, field.

PROGRESS SLOW ON WELL

Holbrook, Ariz., June 14.—The Adams well appears to have passed its stratum of oil and gas permeation and now the drilling is in a hard dark substance, in which progress is very slow. The Apache has had trouble with its bore and has started a new hole, 100 feet distant.

Wooer's Beautiful Home a Shack—Woman Dying

Kalispell, Mont., June 14.—"Come share my beautiful home on Kallispell Lake," wrote a local lumberjack to Mrs. Nellie Cully, of Birmingham, Ala. Accompanied by her two children, Mrs. Cully came to Kalispell. The "beautiful home" consisted of one log shack, windowless and dirt-floored. Mrs. Cully is dying of tuberculosis developed in the shack. The kiddies are in an orphan home.

THEODORE SEARS DEAD

Amarillo, Texas, June 14.—Theodore H. Sears, 67, general superintendent of the southern division of the western lines of the Atchison, Topoka and Santa Fe railway died here Saturday night of pneumonia.
