SEATTLE, Wash., June 21.—Three thousand miles away from the political maelstrom in the east, the newspapers published in full the special interview given by president Wilson to the New York World, the tributes praise given senator Harding by former president Taft, the equivocal support given the Republican nominees and platform by Herbert Hoover, and at the same time the emphatic endorsement of the Democratic nomination.
