Gene Payo To Train The "Kid"

Fast Boxer Is Back In Town

GENE PAYO, A. E. P. featherweight champ and brother to the illustrious "Kid" Payo who holds the border feather title, arrived in the city Saturday morning from Pittsburgh for the purpose of training his brother for his meeting with Dick Griffin at the Fort Bliss punch bowl on July 13.

Will Be In "Kid's" Corner.
Hearing that his brother was to fight Griffin, who is well known throughout the west as one of the fastest little men of his weight, Gene hopped on the train and came post haste to El Paso in order to be in the "kid's" corner when he meets the Fort Worth mizer. He does not doubt for the minute that Payo will defeat Griffin, but being a veteran in the ring himself, he realizes the value of scientific training and there is little doubt but that the border titleholder will be well taken care of when he steps into the ring to meet the East Texan.

Gene's last bout was with

Harry Del Ros. The contest was termed a draw by the referee, although the El Paso boy was given the best of it by the newspaper critics. He has fought "Chick" Rogers and several other good boys since leaving the city last March. At one time Gene was matched to meet Benny Valger, the "French flash," at Canton, O., but Valger refused to make weight for the match.

The "Kid" and Gene will do their first boxing together Sunday afternoon at the International club, according to a statement issued from Payo headquarters Saturday morning. Gene wants to rest up a day or two before the puts on the gloves as he may remain in El Paso long enough to sign on for a fight himself before matchmaker Jimmy Brown's Fort Bliss club.

Word was received from Dick Griffin Saturday that he is ready to leave at any time. He is expected in within the next few days and will begin work for the July 13 battle.
