FUSION OF FACTIONS INTO THIRD PARTY IS COMPLETED BY VOTE

Non-Partisan Leaguers and Single Taxers Vote to Join National Labor Party After Ultimatum From Labor Men; Plumb Plan, Capital Tax Levy and Nationalization of Mines Controverted Party Principles.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 12.—With plans practically completed for the formation of a new party embracing the minority, liberal and radical groups, the Labor party and committee of 48 went into joint session this afternoon.

Besides the two principal groups, the meeting was joined by the Single Tax party, World War Veterans, Non-partisan League and several other organizations. Amalgamation of the principal groups attempting to form a new political party was effected here today. The committee of 48 voted to join the National Labor party, which has non-partisan League group and a delegation of Single Taxers marched into the hall and their representatives were heard to denounce the plan.

The committee of 48 delegates voted to amalgamate before they had heard the report of the conference committee on the stumbling blocks to the proposed union. These points were the Plumb plan and imposition of a capital tax.

Before adjourning, the Labor party session indicated that the new party candidate possibly tonight, and that there may be state tickets in some districts.

The Labor party in an ultimatum adopted last night after 48 hours of deliberation, and to bring the party and the committee of 48 together, voted to proceed to the adoption of a platform and election pledges if a conference report was not ready by 10 o'clock this morning.

At midnight, the conference adjourned, and the delegates returned to their respective headquarters to discuss the report.

Bolshevik Troops Enter Minsk As Allied Request For Armistice Received

No Reply Received From Moscow On Allies' Proposal for Armistice; Arms and Ammunition Will Be Supplied to Poland if Peace Offer Is Refused by Soviet; Americans Prepare for Evacuation of Warsaw.

LONDON, Eng., July 12.—Minsk has been entered by Russian Bolshevik forces according to an official statement received here from Moscow which says Bolshevik troops occupied the town on the morning of July 11.

The statement continues: "The Bolsheviks have captured a section of the railway from Gukhovich station to Brodway station in the Minsk region, and are advancing rapidly toward Minsk, capturing an armored train." "Minsk is the capital of the Russian government of the same name and is situated on a branch of the Belarussian railway, 250 miles north of Warsaw. For some time the Russian Bolshevik forces have been operating on Minsk from the north and south, and the position of the city has become very critical. It is in danger of capture by the Bolsheviks.
