Federal Judge Seeks to Fix Responsibility for Disclosure

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 5.—Indictments against 41 leaders in the recent railroad strikes, which Judge Samuel Alschuler refused to receive yesterday because the names of those indicted had become public through a "leak" several hours before the federal grand jury completed its report, were returned today.

Judge Alschuler ordered the indictment placed under seal until investigation of the leak is completed. Reporters of afternoon papers who published the list of those indicted yesterday are to be subpoenaed, the court announced.

15 SHIPS ALLOCATED TO PACIFIC COAST

Washington, D. C., Aug. 5.—Allocation of 15 new 15,000 deadweight ton passenger vessels now building in eastern yards for service between the Pacific coast and the Orient was announced today by the shipping board. Five of the vessels, all of which are to have a speed of 17 knots, are allocated to the Pacific Mail Steamship company for service between San Francisco, Honolulu, Yokohama, Shanghai and Japan.
