The program of institute meetings has just been issued with the premium list for the show.

January—Meeting open for exhibition birds; selecting breeders to produce layers.

February—Fertility and hatching; sex; natural and artificial incubation.

March—Cold, heated and colony brooders; care of baby chicks.

April—Developing chicks; lice and mites; poultry houses; feeding breads and layers.

May—Poultry marketing; demonstration of young birds.

June—Feed and care during moult; planning the next show.

August—Selecting winter layers; annual social meeting.

September—Preparations for winter; securing birds for early shows.

October—Prevention and cure of disease; feeding for utility.

November—Prevention and cure of disease; feeding for utility.

December—Final preparation and showing birds.
