

Al Walker Arrives in Butte City Leaguers Ready

COAST CHAMP IN THIS CITY FOR TITLE GO

AL WALKER is in town. Accompanied by his aggressive manager, Fred Wilson, San Francisco's bid for the bantamweight title arrived in El Paso Saturday morning from his home on the western slope and this afternoon at 3 o'clock worked out at the International club with Soldier Garrett, one of the fastest boys at Port Bliss.

In order to conform with training schedules, Griffin and Walker, who are to meet in the last event of the all-star Port Bliss card on January 14, have agreed for the first round to meet at 3 o'clock in future, while Walker will do the middle one hour and a half later. Some difficulty is being experienced in getting sparring partners for Walker but manager Wilson, who is working industriously and indications are that everything will be fixed up in great shape when he steps into the ring for his initial exhibition before the big Messrs. Sweeney and Jones at the International club here, made every preparation there for the coming of the new champion.

Walker comes with the reputation of being the best boy of his weight on the coast with the possible exception of one. He is a heavy bantamweight and the stipulated weight of 125 pounds six hours before the contest will not leave him at a disadvantage at all as claimed by the "conscientious objector" recently, but an excellent business take him on up to 125 pounds and Walker obviously has no qualms of conscience at meeting Griffin, who may have an advantage of some pounds when the time comes. Walker is so confident of his punching ability that he is not giving a thought to the "conscientious objector" who has been called "Dandy Dick" will have a weight advantage. Griffin worked out before the press for the first time Friday afternoon and showed that he was in the best of condition. The clever little Texan is in splendid physical condition and believed that he will win over Walker just as readily as he has other contestants here.

He has had some trouble with California barons in the past, owing to the aggressive style of the California boys, but now he asserts that he is going to give the fight from the first bell. "I have heard a great deal of the ability of Walker and I know that he is a strong, tough boy who can hit and hit hard," said "Dandy Dick." "I do not believe that he will knock me out, however, as his manager, Fred Wilson, claims. Wilson is known throughout the country as a manager who never handles a dead one and I do not doubt but that he has a great little man in Walker. When it comes to confidence, though, I have some of my own."

Griffin Jones and Sunny Jim are doing hard work for their scheduled ten rounds contest as the first main event of the evening. With an eye out for the fighting ability of the two men, matchmaker Jimmy Erwin lost no time in getting them together. The records of the two men are strikingly similar, in spite of the fact that Jones is a veteran. Sunny Jim holds a decision over Jones, who in turn beat the south-western favorite, speedball Hayden. Matchmaker Erwin performed a mighty creditable stunt in bringing these two men together and it is small wonder that the two are packed in at the Panhandle where such an affair is appreciated.

Truly the "conscientious objector" is having a hard time. Young Tommy Murphy, the eighth century favorite in putting in some good lines for his scheduled four rounds, is going to meet Garrett at the Panhandle, having fought several rounds before, is getting in some more, as it is believed he is meeting a hard man in Garrett.

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
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
