OIL IS FOUND AT 74 FEET IN NEW WELL

Fort Stockton, Texas, Jan. 11.—A test showing of oil boiled out of well No. 11 of the Grant Oil corporation at a depth of 74 feet and is causing much interest among oil men here.

The man witnessing the showing was Colonel Lewis of the Detroit commission. He arrived here Monday to inspect the Grant wells.

Well No. 10, which attracted widespread attention by its phenomenal output last Wednesday was not put on pump Monday, but 48 were pumped from the overflow.

J. W. Grant said the Detroit Oil company has contracted to sink a deep test well beginning not later than February 1. By the terms of the contract, the Detroit company must drill at least 300 feet, using a standard drill company of going 350 feet deep.

The Grant company will continue to pump until the Detroit concern fails to get oil at 300 feet.

C. S. Anderson, representing J. C. Trues, Pittsburgh oil magnate, has telegraphed he will arrive here today. He has an option on four sections of land.

C. S. Dues, El Paso hotel man, is here negotiating for a site on Stockton street. He said he will erect a modern hotel if the oil development continues.

The Oil Well Supply company has selected a site on the Orient railway in Fort Stockton for a pipe yard and supply depot.

OIL OUTPUT IN TEXAS IS CLIMBING UP

Dallas, Texas, Jan. 11.—Texas produced 10,576,316 barrels of crude petroleum during the calendar year 1920, having a value of approximately \$218,492,000, according to figures collected by the research department of the Texas chamber of commerce.

A graphic chart showing oil production of Texas for the past ten years runs steadily upward indicating that future production of oil in this state will be still larger than the record-breaking yield of 1920. Texas petroleum production for the past ten years runs as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Year, Production (Barrels). 1911: 2,228,474; 1912: 11,725,287; 1913: 18,009,478; 1914: 26,424,124; 1915: 34,912,791; 1916: 37,641,603; 1917: 22,412,247; 1918: 38,738,021; 1919: 82,212,000; 1920: 102,276,218.

Thus for the past ten years Texas has climbed steadily upward as an oil producing state. The first oil production recorded in Texas was in 1859 at Corsicana. Since that time Texas has produced 218,492,000 barrels of oil. Of this total 20 percent was produced in 1920, a fact showing that Texas has only recently really found her petroleum resources.

Texas coastal field production was 20,418,400 barrels valued at \$232,332,000 in 1920, according to the research department of the Magnolia Petroleum company, and the central and north Texas fields produced 75,271,818 barrels at a value of \$121,241,000.

There are about 1111 producing wells in Texas, according to "The Oil Weekly."

Texas total income from the oil industry will average \$1,300,000,000 at the present rate of production, according to a recent statement of J. S. Cullinan, of Houston, president of the Texas chamber of commerce.

Toyah Oil Well Yields Product At 150 Feet

Toyah, Tex., Jan. 11.—The Clawson Lubricating Oil company completed the first well in this field late this afternoon on section eight, school block 29, Reeves county.

At 150 feet the oil which is in greater volume than in any other well in this field was found in a sand which was penetrated to a depth of nine feet. The product is of high lubricating quality. No estimate of the yield will be ventured by the managers of the property.

The company will drill 20 wells on this tract.
