The following is the prize story on Abraham Lincoln, written by Fred Scribner Grade nine, Ellensburg school.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN.

Abraham Lincoln was born in a log cabin in Hardin county, Kentucky, Feb. 12, 1809. When he had reached his eight year his father removed to the back woods of Indiana. Here Lincoln was employed in the various tasks which are always connected with the founding of a home in a wild and comparatively uncivilized country. Few educational advantages were afforded him in his frontier home but he was taught to read and write by his mother. When Lincoln was nine years of age his mother died, but her influence was lasting and her teachings were never forgotten by the boy she had so faithfully tried to instruct aright.

When Lincoln was nineteen, he worked on a flat-boat going to New Orleans. When he returned his father moved to Illinois. Lincoln, now of age, again went to New Orleans, afterwards acting in the capacity of clerk and later practicing surveying. In 1832 he was chosen captain of a company and served for a time in the Black Hawk war.

He now studied law under great difficulties and was admitted to the bar in 1836. Two years before he was elected to the Illinois legislature and was re-elected for three successive terms. In Congress, to which he was elected in 1846, he attracted great attention by the power and eloquence of his debates with Stephen A. Douglas on the "Repeal of the Missouri Compromise."

On Nov. 6, 1860, Lincoln was elected president. The war-cloud which had hovered so long over the land now burst in all its fury. During this crucial period Pres. Lincoln managed the affairs of the government with wonderful tact and prudence. On Sept. 22, 1862, he issued the Emancipation Proclamation, which won for him the love and respect of the colored people and the admiration of the civilized world. Again Lincoln was elected to the presidency in Nov. 1864. At length the terrible war drew to a close.

During a play at Ford's theatre April 14, 1865, an actor, John Wilkes Booth, entered the President's box, fired a pistol at Mr.

Lincoln and leaped to the stage below. In doing so his foot became entangled in the American flag, which was draped about the box, and he fell heavily, injuring his ankle. However he escaped from the rear of the building. The President died on the following day in the house to which he had been removed. The country was plunged into deepest mourning. Probably no man since Washington was ever more honored and respected by the American people.

The chief characteristic of Abraham Lincoln was his great self-reliance. Not once, during his life, was he known to ask for assistance or advice from any person. His mind, like a calm, unruffled sea, was neither disturbed by excessive joys nor great discouragements. Believing in a Supreme Being, who watches over and controls the affairs of men, he exemplified those views in his every day life. His honesty was proverbial. He was kind and loving as a father and generous to a fault.

Though not handsome of feature, his life was beautiful, so full of "charity for all, and malice toward none." He will ever have a warm place in the hearts of the American people, and with each passing year let there be added another tribute to the loving memory of the man who saw both good and great.




