Land Office Notice.

The following notice has been received from the United States land office at Washington, D. C.:

Registers and Receivers, United States land office, Gentlemen:—Section 2294, Revised Statutes as amended by the act of May 26, 1890, provides in the first paragraph: "In any case in which the applicant for the benefit of the homestead, pre-emption, timber-culture, or desert land law is prevented, by reason of distance, bodily infirmity, or other good cause, from personal attendance at the district land office, he or she may make the affidavit required by law, before any commissioner of the United States circuit court or the clerk of a

court of record for the county in which the land is situated and transmit the same with the fees and commission to the register and receiver."

Although the circular of June 25 1890, 10 L. 547, and the general circular of February 6, 1892, p. 9, do not give the explicit directions on this point, yet the language of this paragraph, by reason of distance, bodily infirmity, or other good cause, clearly implies that the applicant shall show to the satisfaction of the register and receiver why he does not appear before them to make the affidavit required by law.

You will accordingly hereinafter reject all applications to make entry of public lands under said section unless they are accompanied by the affidavit of the applicant, setting out specifically why he cannot appear at the local office.

Union Party Platform

Believing that those who think alike on the leading issues of the day must either work harmoniously together or have the efficiency of their work largely neutralized and lost, and that the time has come for a complete and permanent union of all those who are opposed to the gold standard and every other species of monopoly whereby favored classes receive unearned benefits at the expense of the many; and knowing that a recognition in which all meet on an equal footing regardless of previous party adherence and name must meet the hearty support of all who honestly seek to put their beliefs into practice and the only motive which could reasonably be assigned for refusing to unite with every one working on the same line would be a desire for personal advantage in position or influence by reason of priority in some existing organization—a spirit which sooner or later will land them in one or the other camps of the monopolists—the opposition.

Therefore, we the members of the democratic, peoples party and silver republican central committees of Pierce county, at a regular meeting this day called, do agree to organize the above forces in this county and so far as possible in this state and nation, under the name of Union Party upon the following declaration of principles:

First—We believe that the majority should rule, and upon all grave public questions the voice of the people should be heard directly, and for the purpose of securing this most essential reform, we demand that the people by direct legislation shall have the power to initiate and repeal laws.

Second—We demand a national money, safe, sound and flexible, issued by the government only, without the intervention of banks of issue as full legal tender for all debts, public and private with a just, equitable and efficient means of distribution direct to the people through the lawful disbursements of the government; that the volume of circulating medium be sufficient to meet the requirements of the business and population of this country and to restore and maintain a just level of prices of labor and commodities.

Third—We pledge ourselves unreservedly for bimetallism—the free and unlimited coinage of both silver and gold into standard money at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1 and without waiting for the action of any other nation.

Fourth—We believe that the value of every franchise monopoly which is created by the public should go to the public either through direct use and operation or through the appropriation of such value by taxation, thereby reducing taxation on private industry.

Fifth—We demand submission to the voters of this state at the earliest possible opportunity of a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to make liberal exemptions of private property from taxation, and that the legislature proceed to make such exemptions as soon as it can be done.

For the purpose of perfecting the above organization, we recommend the formation of precinct clubs throughout the county, and for that purpose that a chairman, secretary, and seven advisory committeemen be now chosen and that they be given power to do all things necessary in the premises, that a single nominating convention be held, and that such convention be as large as possible in order that full representation may be had.

Further, we recommend that the state central committees be requested to combine and consider the advisability of having but one convention for the purpose of naming a ticket this fall and to take up the subject of general organization in this state.
