**Communication From Nile.**  
Two months ago when I bade you goodbye, I promised to write. In my time, having traveled over most of the United States and portions of Mexico and Canada, I must say I never saw a more beautiful mountainous country than this. Were the economic conditions as they should be, this would be a paradise on earth. There are twenty families in this settlement, about five miles up and down the Natches. About twenty-five school children. The center of the settlement is about twenty-eight miles from North Yakima, and about the same distance from Ellensburg. If a grade of about two and a half miles was made on the hill between the head of the Wenas and the Natches, most of the trade of this settlement would go to your city. Miss Florence Cameron is teaching a four months' term of school here. Under her auspices we had memorial services at the Nile school house last Friday. The scholars under her aid and direction decorated the school room most beautifully with evergreens, flowers, flags and a fine picture of our martyred President Lincoln. The exercises were of a high order showing taste, talent and laborious work on the part of the teacher, also study and close application on the part of the children, and consisted of reading, recitations and patriotic songs which applied to the present as well as the late civil war.  
Those taking part were Ella, Olive, Maud, Lillian, and Henry Sedge; Ora Sophrina, Nora and Archie Lindsay; Stella and Mary Markle; Mona and Ralph Carmack; Bessie and Johnny Beck; Ada Chase; Jessie, Mattie and Sherbie Rodman. Each acquitted themselves with great credit. The teacher read the Nile Telegraph, a spicy, fortnightly paper. There was a very notable article written by the teacher on the causes and effects of the late civil war, showing a knowledge of history, and insight into politics of the United States that was astonishing, and more especially as a British citizen, as Miss Cameron is a citizen of Vancouver, B. C. If every citizen of the United States would take the interest in Memorial day that she does, it would be a grand holiday. I being the only Union soldier present, of course noticed her enthusiasm with pride, and the fervor and enthusiasm of the scholars in reciting and singing those old patriotic pieces stirred the deepest emotions of my heart.  
The London Spectator, in a late, able and friendly article says the United States is the first government that ever declared war against another nation on account of its cruelty to its own subjects. Now when we do conquer let us not get the swell head and stop to blow our trumpets, but let the English speaking people forge on in the interests of humanity. J. H. M.
