Our Alaska Letter.

HEAD OF RAPIDS, KLUTINA RIVER ALASKA, July 21, '98
MR. M. E. FLYNN—Dear Sir—Your letter of April 17th, reached me on July 19th, so you see that our postal conveniences are rather limited as is every thing else except mosquitoes. Well we are about 75 miles from Port Valdez and we have made every mile under difficulties. We had to cross the Valdez glacier which is about 30 miles long and had no wood all the way except what we carried on our sleighs, and pulling a sleigh, if any body asks you if it is hard work you can tell them that you think it is. The storms on the glacier were very bad. It stormed a whole week once and we had big snow slides at the end of it, in which a great many people were buried. Six bodies have been taken out so far. After we got off the glacier the trouble was too little snow, and we had to draw our outfits over slush snow and go in over our knees almost every step. Well we went as far as we could and then build boats and came down the river and across the lake (lake 20 miles.) Arrived here all safe. The rapids from here down to Copper river, a distance of 25 miles, is very dangerous and few attempt to shoot them. About two thirds of them come to grief, so a great many are waiting till it freezes up before going farther and others take from two to three months' provisions and pack down to the Copper, going from there up the stream prospecting. I saw Moon and Van Lake camped a mile from the beach. Moon had a lame back and have not seen or heard anything of them since. The James Beard party are camped here. They intend to stay here until they can sled down on the ice. John Wilson has just returned from Copper river. He was up about 110 miles from the mouth of this river, which would be about 300 miles from the mouth of Copper river. He prospected all the streams from here up but did not find gold in paying quantities. They are camped at the mouth of the Taslina, the next river from this about ten miles from this river. Earnest Wheat is stopping there with the cache and is all O. K. The Beard party are camped about a half a mile from here and I just took John Wilson over there. It is useless to send newspapers to me as I never get them. It is impossible for the mail carrier to bring them as he has to pack all the mail on his back, therefore the best thing to do is to send clippings in letters.
There are a great many people discouraged and are selling their outfits and going back to the states. The party I am with have all gone up Copper river prospecting, and I am here taking care of the caches. There are 12 in the party. Have not heard from them lately. This is a lovely climate in summer, but the drawback if mosquitoes. You never saw such oceans of wild flowers. Camp life here is very tiresome, and very few in camp—all have gone up the river. They have a very hard time towing a boat up the river. It is a common thing to see strong, able bodied men sit down and cry like children. They are almost eaten up by mosquitoes, which a horse cannot live through, and then again they are wet in ice water up to their waists mostly all the time.
The barber business is a dead failure in this country as every one leaves beard and hair grow as a protection from mosquitos. I'm in good health and eat three square meals a day. Have not had any fresh meat except salmon, which is plentiful here. I guess this is about all that would interest you, so will close. Give my regards to all and write soon. It would be impossible for Mayer to overtake me now with an outfit. Yours truly,
