Proposed Amendments to the Constitution.

STATE OF WASHINGTON,
OFFICE OF SECRETARY OF STATE,
TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: WHEREAS
an act of the legislature approved March 13, 1898, entitled as follows: "An act to amend the constitution of this state, and to provide for a constitutional convention to be held in November, 1898, relative to taxation," there is hereby published for the consideration of the voters of the state of Washington the following proposed amendments to the constitution of said state, Section 201 Article 1 of the constitution of the state of Washington shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The legislature shall provide by law a uniform and equal rate of assessment and taxation on all property in the state, according to its value in money and shall prescribe such regulations by general law as shall secure a just valuation for taxation of all property, so that every person and corporation shall pay a tax in proportion to his or her or its property. FOR STATE CONVENTION
Official Call for the People's
Party State Convention.

At a meeting of the executive com-
mittee of the state of Washington,
held in Tacoma, July 5, 1898, the
following resolution was adopted:
Resolved—That the state conven-
tion of the people's party be held at
Ellensburg, Tuesday, September 6,
1898, at 10 o'clock a. m. for the pur-
pose of nominating two supreme
judges and two congressmen, and
that the basis of representation shall
be one delegate for every one hun-
dred votes or majority fraction there-
of, cast at the last general election
for John R. Rogers for governor.
