Curing Cuts and Sores.

Two Recipes for Chili Sauce.

Twelve large ripe tomatoes, four ripe or three green peppers, two onions, two tablespoonfuls of salt, two of sugar, one of cinnamon, three cups of vinegar; peel tomatoes and onions, chop separately very fine, add the peppers, (chopped) to the other ingredients and boil one and a half hours or until quite thick. Seal in large pickle bottles, stone jugs or fruit cans.

No. 2. Peel and chop twelve large, ripe tomatoes, two large onions, four green peppers, two tablespoonfuls of ground mustard, two of salt, two of sugar, (brown) one teaspoon of cinnamon, one of ginger, a little horse-radish, and three large cups of vinegar. Boil slowly until it thickens and let it cool before bottling.

Green peppers are nice after being soaked in weak brine twenty-four hours and then stuffed with cold cooked meat and bread chopped fine and baked in gravy.
