

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Minutes of the meeting of the town council of Oroville, Washington, April 19, 1915. Present—Mayor Prentice, Councilmen Beale, Smith and Friis. Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved as read. Letter from E. A. Welland in regard to payment of engineering work on improvement district was read and motion was made by Councilman Friis seconded by Councilman Smith that the clerk draw a warrant for \$40 in payment of this work. Motion carried. Motion was made by Councilman Friis seconded by Councilman Smith, that Mr. Spencer be employed to water and care for Franchise Park for the season for the sum of \$5. Motion carried. The application of E. J. Judd for retail liquor license was read and motion was made that the license be granted. Yeas—Beale, Friis, Smith. Noes—none. Mr. Powell appeared before the council asking the permission to install a gasoline tank and stand pipe in front of the property of the Oroville Commercial Co., on the corner of Main street and First avenue. Motion was made by Councilman Beale, seconded by Councilman Friis that the permission be granted. Motion carried. At the request of certain citizens motion was made by Councilman Friis, seconded by Councilman Smith, that the clerk be instructed to purchase a barrel of crude petroleum for the purpose of putting on sloughs in the neighborhood of the town for the purpose of killing mosquitoes. Motion carried. Petition of certain citizens for an extension of the water mains commencing at the corner of Main street and Central avenue running north to the intersection of Second avenue on Main street was read. Motion was made by Councilman Friis, seconded by Councilman Beale, that the petition be granted and ordered laid. The water committee was then instructed to prepare an amendment to the water ordinance as soon as possible. The matter of bids for the proposed improvement was taken up and as there were no bids offered after some discussion in the matter of changing some of the grades the matter was laid on the table and a meeting of the council was ordered Friday afternoon, April 23, for the purpose of going over the ground and determining what changes were to be made. On motion council adjourned. E. R. HOOSE, Clerk.
