STUDEBAKER ANNOUNCES NEW MODELS WITH ADDED REFINEMENTS.

New Series 17 Four Priced at \$8.75—Six Seils for \$1085—More than 3,000 of New Cars Ready in Hands of Dealers

Announcement just made of the new series 17 Studebaker six-cylinder four-cylinder came in the nature of a double triumph for the Studebaker corporation. For not only is this giant organization maintained Studebaker effecting 11 added refinements, and in several instances reducing prices, it is further startling the public by announcing that shipments of the new cars have been going forward for the past two months so that more than 3,000 dealers already are able to show the series 17 models.

The basic design of the series 17 cars show no radical changes. The mechanical principles that have proven successful are retained intact.

The new refinements have been in the direction of securing greater roominess and comfort, along with still further conveniences. In spite of these added features however, the new series 17 four-cylinder seven passenger car now sells for \$875. The three-passenger roadster is priced at \$530. The six-cylinder seven-passenger touring car priced at \$1085 and the three passenger roadster at \$1060.

A notable addition to the Studebaker line is the six-cylinder seven-passenger model, the price of which is \$1375.

Other new series 17 six-cylinder models are those three passenger landauroadster at \$1250; four passenger coupe at \$1200 and seven-passenger limousine at \$1550. The four-cylinder model includes the three passenger landauroadster in addition to the touring car and roadster type. One of the most striking refinements of the series 17 cars is the divided front seat effect. The front seats are of the divided type of construction and are justable for and aft.

The break and clutch pedals have been lengthened in order to provide greater leverage and a consequent ease in control. This pedal adjustment supplemented by the front seat adjustment provides for drivers of various sizes and is a convenience appreciated by motorists.

Another contribution to ease in driving is the removal of the cowl board forward and upward, thus gaining more leg room, and the more compact grouping of instruments upon the cowl. The arrangement is unique. Illumination of the instruments are secured by a new indirect lighting system.

By moving the gasoline tank from the cowl to the rear of the car and installing the Steward vacuum feed system to insure a steady supply of gasoline at all times, more room is obtained in the front of the car.

Several refinements that anticipate the wishes of drivers are the provision of a radiator guard to prevent mud from splashing up into the radiator, the removal of the carburetor air control bracket from the steering post to the cowl board, and the lapping of the upper glass of the wind shield over the lower glass, thus rendering the windshield absolutely storm proof.

The features that made the 1915 Studebaker models notable for power efficiency are retained in the new series 17 cars. The motor has a three seven-eighth inch bore and five inch stroke, developing 40 horse power in the four-cylinder model and 50 horse power in the six-cylinder car. The Warner two unit self starting and lighting system is used with still further refinements that give it power to turn the motor over easily, even in the coldest weather.

Rear axle is of the safety insuring Studebaker full-floating type with a complete equipment of Timken bearings throughout. The long resilient springs are

of the three-quarter elliptic type in the rear and semi-elliptic in front. Riding comfort on the road is further provided by the Goodrich tires of generous size, 2 1/4 inches, safety tread on the rear. Larger and deeper fenders add attractiveness to the car. The standard color adopted is known as "Studebaker blue" its lasting richness having been attained only after extensive and costly experiments.

The brakes are large, easy acting and light gripping, with 15x2 inch drums and are of ample size to stop the car within a few feet.

The rims used on the wheels have a peculiar interlocking device that springs the tire off when it is desired to remove a casing. This does away with the necessity to use a chisel to get a tire off of a rusted rim and serves as a greatly increased convenience.

Coincident with the appearance of the new series 17 models, it is announced that the Studebaker output for 1916 will total 100,000 cars. The factory force is now working on a schedule that insures that number of machines during the coming year.
