PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO STATE CONSTITUTION.
To be voted on November 7, 1922.
An amendment of Section 22, Article I of the state constitution, relating to the rights of accused persons in the State of Washington.
Office of the Secretary of State.
To whom it may concern: In obedience to the legislature, approved by the Governor February 18, 1921, entitled as follows: "An Act providing for the amendment of Section 22 of Article I of the constitution of the State of Washington, relating to the rights of accused persons," there is hereby published for the consideration of the voters of the State of Washington the following proposed amendment to the constitution of the said state.

CHAPTER 13.
(S. B. 43)
An Act providing for the amendment of Section 22 of Article I of the constitution of the State of Washington, relating to the rights of accused persons.
Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Washington:
Section 1. That at the general election to be held in this state on Tuesday next succeeding the first Monday in November, 1922, there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their adoption and approval or rejection an amendment to Section 22 of Article I of the constitution of the State of Washington, so that the same shall, when amended, read as follows:
"Section 22. In criminal prosecutions the accused shall have the right to appear and defend in person, or by counsel thereof, to testify in his own behalf, to meet the witnesses against him face to face, to have compulsory process to compel the attendance of witnesses in his own behalf, to have a speedy public trial by an impartial jury of the county in which the offense is charged to have been committed and the right to appeal in all cases: Provided, The route traversed by any railway coach, train or public conveyance, and the water traversed by any boat shall be criminal districts; and the jurisdiction of all public offenses committed on any such railway coach, train, boat or other public conveyance, or at any station or depot upon such route, shall be in any county through which the said car, coach, train, boat or other public conveyance may pass during the trip or voyage, or in which the trip or voyage may begin or terminate. In no instance shall any accused person before final judgment be compelled to advance money or fees to secure the rights herein guaranteed."

Passed the House January 27, 1921.
Passed the Senate February 9, 1921.
Permitted to become law without the signature of the Governor.

To whom it may concern: In obedience to the legislature, approved by the Governor March 3, 1921, entitled as follows: "An Act providing for the amendment of Section 23, Article II of the constitution of the State of Washington, relating to the compensation to be paid members of the legislature," there is hereby published for the consideration of the voters of the State of Washington the following proposed amendment to the constitution of the said state:

CHAPTER 12.
(S. B. 232)
An Act providing for the amendment of Section 23, Article II of the constitution of the State of Washington, relating to compensation to be paid members of the legislature.
Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Washington:
Section 1. That at the general election to be held in this state on Tuesday next succeeding the first Monday in November, 1922, there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state, for their adoption and approval or rejection, an amendment to Article II of the Constitution of the State of Washington, so that Section 23 of said Article II when amended shall read as follows:
Section 23. Each member of the legislature shall receive for his services, ten dollars for each day's attendance during the session, and ten cents for every mile he shall travel in going to and returning from the place of meeting of the legislature, on the most usual route.
Section 2. The secretary of state shall cause the foregoing amendment to be published for at least three months next preceding the election, in some weekly newspaper, in every county where a newspaper is published throughout the state.
Passed the Senate March 3, 1921.
Approved by the Governor March 21, 1921.

An amendment of section 4, Article 8 of the state constitution relating to expenditure of money in State Treasury.
Office of the Secretary of State.
To whom it may concern: In obedience to the legislature, approved by the Governor February 18, 1921, entitled as follows: "An Act providing for the amendment of section 4 of Article 8 of the constitution of the State of Washington relating to the expenditures of moneys in the state treasury," there is hereby published for the consideration of the voters of the State of Washington the following proposed amendment to the constitution of said state.

CHAPTER 14.
(H. B. 63)
An Act providing for the amendment of Section 4 of Article 8 of the constitution of the State of Washington relating to the expenditure of moneys in the State Treasury.
Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Washington:
Section 1. That at the general election to be held in this state on Tuesday next succeeding the first Monday in November, 1922, there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state, for their adoption and approval or rejection an amendment to Section 4 of Article 8 of the constitution of the State of Washington, so that the same shall, when amended, read as follows:
Section 4. No moneys shall ever be paid out of the treasury of this state, or any of its funds, or any of the funds under its management, except in pursuance of an appropriation by law, nor unless such payment be made within one calendar month after the end of the next ensuing fiscal biennium, and every such law making a new appropriation, or continuing or reviving an appropriation, shall distinctly specify the sum appropriated, and the object to which it is to be applied, and it shall not be sufficient for such law to refer to any other law to fix such sum.
Passed the House January 25, 1921.
Passed the Senate February 9, 1921.
Approved by the Governor February 18, 1921.
