ALMOST A RIOT ON WATERFRONT

For a time yesterday afternoon it was feared there was going to be serious trouble at the Flyer dock, and had it not been for the intervention of the police officers the Flyer would have been greatly delayed in leaving the dock on her regular 4:50 trip.

Early in the afternoon people began gathering at the dock, intending to go to Seattle. When the Flyer arrived fully 1,500 people were on hand to get on board. The captain, seeing the crowd, announced that he was allowed to carry only 500 people, and was persistent in seeing that no more than that number passed onto the boat.

The people began crowding and jamming until the police were called and quieted the crowd. A close count of every one passing down the gangplank was made, and when the allotted number, 500, was reached no more were allowed to go on board. Fully a thousand people were sorely disappointed. Many of them patronized the Interurban electric line later in the day.

FOREST KING BREAKS RECORD

SEATTLE, July 5.—Forest King, hero of a dozen sensational turf battles and winner of numerous minor stakes on both this and other Western tracks, added another triumph to his checkered career yesterday by winning the Celebration handicap at The Meadows. As in former instances in his career when the unexpected happened, the brown son of Handsome went to the post badly overlooked yesterday, opening at 6 and closing at 10 to 1, with few takers.

Three minutes later 12,000 people saw the horse not only win the rich stake from the best field which has faced the barrier this season, but also establish a new track record for the distance, one mile and a quarter. King made the distance, which is the same as the Derby course, in 2:07 1/4, taking a whole second off the time made by Blue Eyes, winner of the 1904 Derby. The winner carried 111 pounds. Jockey Buxton piloted him to victory.
