King Ed. Hobnobs With Commoners and Wins Friends

(By United Press Leased Wire.) BERLIN, Feb. 10.—King Edward set aside all precedent today by attending a reception at the city hall as the guest of the municipality.

The king hobnobbed with tradesmen in a democratic manner such as was never seen before on the part of a monarch in this city. He discussed local affairs with the aldermen and seemed greatly interested in all the plans and conditions of the local government.

Pauline Kirschner, the burgo-master's daughter, offered the king a draught of old wine, which he accepted from her hand with as much appreciation as he could have shown the daughter of the emperor.

By his good feeling and expressions of democratic feeling the king has won the Berlin public and even the socialists show him favors and take great delight in comparing his attitude with that of the kaiser.

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FACES AWFUL CRIME AFTER TWO YEARS



SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Feb. 10.—Wandering over mountain and plain on the trail of a man he declares to have impersonated him in the commission of a horrible crime, Bert M. Taylor, despairing of ever finding his enemy and in a fit of despondency, has given himself into the hands of a deputy sheriff, knowing that by so doing he has probably begun a journey to the gallows.

Taylor is now confined in the county jail here, awaiting the arrival of the sheriff from Minden, Nebraska, who will take him back to the scene of the crime. A mysterious Jake Martin, who looked enough like Taylor to be a twin brother, is the author of the crime, according to Taylor. This is the story Taylor told. Martin's sweetheart had mistaken Taylor for her lover, and Martin swore vengeance, which he carried out seven years later in Minden. He appeared in the town in the evening, hunted up Taylor, chloroformed and bound him in a room, then told him how he would carry out a horrible revenge by committing the Minden crime. Taylor managed to free himself, and actuated by a fear of suspicion, fled. But no one believes Taylor's story, and he expects to be lynched when he arrives in Minden. He has written farewell letters to his relatives, protesting his innocence, and says he will be willing to die if they will give him a chance to see his little motherless 4-year-old daughter and be allowed to put on clean clothes.

GREAT COMEDIAN'S FAVORITE MONOLOG A LEGEND ABOUT CHRIST'S KINDNESS

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—Coquelin, the great French actor and comedian, who died recently, prized far more highly than the millions of laughs he brought during his career, the tears which he saw occasionally when he recited his favorite monolog, a legend of Christ. The tenderness with which the great actor told the sweet story of Christ's kindness was irresistible, and brought tears to the eyes of even the butterflies of Parisian salons. The legend ran that Christ and Peter, while walking toward Jerusalem, met an aged woman carrying a burden of firewood and weeping.

Peter spoke to her, and she said: "I live in a hut into which the sun never shines. My husband, for a long time before his death, had a cough. Then two of my children began to cough, and they died. Now my last child has a cough. She is so ill she will die soon. If only I could have sunshine in the cot for her!" Then, the legend says, Christ spoke and said: "Go thy way to thy cot. And the sunshine shall always follow thee." A light formed about the aged burdened woman as she went smiling to her home. The little cottage was filled with sunshine. And when Peter saw the aged woman again her child was well, and others were basking in the light and joy that surrounded her wherever she went. Gertrude Coghlan, daughter of the late Chas. Coghlan, was introduced by her father, when she was a child, to Coquelin. Miss Coghlan, who is now playing in "A

Traveling Salesman" in New York, says: "My father told me he could not keep back the tears when he heard Coquelin tell this story. He thought that Coquelin really hoped by it to touch the lives and hearts of his hearers and make them better men and women, just as a minister might."
