

SPORTS NEWS PRIZE HUNTERS HOLD BIG BANQUET

**HUNDRED SPORTSMEN
ENTERTAINED AT COMMERCIAL CLUB—PRIZES ARE AWARDED FOR KILLING OF BEASTS.**

Over 100 Pierce county sportsmen of the Game Protective association participated in the annual banquet given to varmint hunters last night at the Commercial Club. The slaughter of varmints has been tremendous in the past few weeks. In the list of prizes were six cougars, 22 wildcats, 23 coyotes, 35 skunks and a lot of hawks, blue jays and other birds—but no crows. That is, no crows appear on the official card. There were some mighty black jays marked "blue jays" and anyone suspicious might think there had been a mistake in labeling the black fellows but, as the law prohibits killing crows, no one cared to investigate.

The banquet was a big success and the prizes went to the little nimrods who went out and bagged wagon loads of easy marks. The real prize hunters, who killed cougars and bob cats, got lower places.

Ira D. Light of Stellacoom got first prize with 2,850 points; Cad Cardinal, Stellacoom, second, 2,615 points; Bikesley, third, 1,820 points; H. F. Foss, Buckley, fourth, 1,625 points; Lawson, fifth, 1,225 points. The prizes ran from \$30 down to \$5.

At six miles he had an easy lead and dropped out, having satisfied the spectators that he had lost some of his old-time speed.


Johnny says he thinks he will show some speed this year and Hall is expecting him to make good.

NEGRO PUG IS FINED \$200

JACK JOHNSON ARRESTED IN NEW YORK FOR ATTEMPTED ASSAULT.

NEW YORK, April 1.—Jack Johnson, the black heavyweight champion prize fighter, was fined \$200 here today on the charge of attempting a statutory offense upon complaint of Amy Douglas, a mulatto woman. The big negro appeared in the court room with confidence that bordered on effrontery and paid the fine with a great assumption of gusto, taking the bills from a large roll of currency.

There was a marked difference in the attitude of the people in the street and about the court room toward the negro, as compared to his reception, upon his arrival here, but he apparently was oblivious to it.

As he left the court room to enter an automobile he was taunted by two negro girls, concerned in the charge, but as the car started, he called back: "I certainly got off cheap. Why, girls, dat was just cigarette money." The car then whirled away amid the jeers and boos of the street crowd.


