

WHAT PARK BONDS WILL BE USED FOR

WHAT THE PARK BOARD WANTS THAT \$750,000 FOR.

Build the Cliff avenue boulevard.
Buy a park in the South End.
Buy a park in the West End.
Extend a boulevard to Point Defiance park.
Extend a paved boulevard to the south city limits.
Utilize the springs in McKinley park for waterworks.
Put a water plant in Point Defiance park.
Make general improvements in all the parks and boulevards.

On April 14 the citizens of Tacoma will vote whether or not to issue \$750,000 bonds on the metropolitan park district for parks and boulevards. The park board last night issued a statement telling why the money is wanted. Primarily it is needed now to take advantage of the offer of the N. P. to give the bluff, extending from the city hall to Old Town, for a waterway boulevard, as the board must begin work on this in a year and finish the work in three years or the N. P. will withdraw the offer.

More parks are also wanted and playgrounds for children are contemplated in different sections. The bonds will bear 5 per cent interest and will be paid in series commencing in ten years, so at the end of 20 years they will all be cancelled.

At the board meeting last night representatives of the South and West End clubs were on hand intimating if the park board would not use part of the money for parks in their respective sections they would vote against the bonds. The West End wants Franklin lake turned into a park and they said the whole thing could be secured for \$10,000. The South End wants Wapato lake and it was estimated that \$100,000 would be needed for that.

The board refused to say what would be done as they said if they agreed beforehand the owners of the property would boost the price. They intend to put parks in both sections, however.

R. L. McCormick made a plea for a site in Wright park for the new historical building. The board agreed to consider it again and an answer will be made next meeting night.

LOCAL WOODMEN TO WELCOME BOAK

Arrangements are in progress for one of the largest meetings ever held by Woodcraft on the occasion of Hon. I. I. Boak's visit to Tacoma on April 27 and May 1. FAIRBANKS FOR DIPLOMATIC POST

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PASADENA, Cal., April 3.—Charles W. Fairbanks, former vice president of the United States, today declared, that although no formal word has been received by him from Washington regarding his appointment to the post of ambassador to Great Britain, he thought it unlikely that he would be compelled to change his present plan of returning to Indianapolis in the near future to resume his law practice.

Fairbanks says that the first intimation he had that his name was linked with that of the diplomatic service, came to him this morning through the newspapers. He appeared reticent in discussing the report and said he could make no formal statement until the matter came to his knowledge officially.

The former vice president is staying here with his son, Frank C. Fairbanks, at 348 Congress street.

ADMITS TAKING WOMEN'S MONEY

Carl Lund, charged with having embezzled \$11.25 from Miss Katherine Smith, was arraigned before Judge Easterday this morning and entered a plea of guilty. He was sent on an errand by Miss Smith and the money was entrusted to his care. Lund, however, left town and spent the money. He is 21 years old, and an effort will be made to send him to the penitentiary.

400 MINERS ON STRIKE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SIOUX FALLS, S. D., April 3.—About a hundred coal miners today laid down the first strike which has taken place in the anthracite region since the expiration of the agreement between the mine workers and the operators.

The walkout took place yesterday at the Kevron mine. The dispute being over alleged repeated cuts in wages made by the company. The strike is said to have the sanction of the national and district officers of the miners' union.

REFUSE LICENSE FOR ROAD HOUSE

Owing to the state law which forbids the maintenance of a road house within one mile of an incorporated city, the county commissioners today refused to renew the liquor license of the Seven Mile house, south of South Tacoma. When the license was granted last year, the Seven Mile house was more than a mile outside the city, but since the annexation of Hunts Prairie to Tacoma, it is within one-half mile of the limits.

Frank Schletz, owner of the road house, will probably pick up his little saloon and take it half a mile farther from town so as to be able to get his license.

GAMBLING CASE SET FOR APRIL 16

Arguments for and against the setting aside of an order made by Judge Easterday whereby the case of the city of Tacoma against "John Doe" Garrett, Henry Newman, and others, charged with gambling, was reverted to the justice court, will be heard April 16 in the superior court. The matter came up before Judge Easterday this morning. City Attorney Frank Baker stating to the court that the former defendant had been made without his knowledge or consent, and that he wished to argue the case. James O'Brien, attorney for the defendants, leaves tomorrow for Arizona, where he will be occupied on a case for nearly a month.

FINDS NO LOVE OF ART IN AMERICA

(By United Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, April 3.—Eugene O'Sullivan, who has no appreciation for his work in the Windy City, Otto Jahn, a noted German sculptor, has renounced his plans for an American career, has decided to leave his bride of four months and return to the fatherland.

"America has no appreciation of art," he said with tears in his eyes today. "A sculptor cannot live here. I hoped to get pupils and orders for work, but none came."

His wife will remain here and teach painting.
