

# G. N. WILL BUILD ALONG OKANOGAN

FILES RESOLUTION TO CONSTRUCT 134 MILES OF BRANCH RAILWAY.

OLYMPIA, June 8.—The Great Northern railway has filed with the secretary of state a certificate that its directors passed a resolution ordering construction and operation of a branch to begin near Wenatchee and then northward and easterly along the Columbia river through the counties of Chelan and Douglas to the junction of the Okanogan and Columbia rivers. The road is to run thence along the Okanogan to a connection with the present Great Northern branch at Orville in Okanogan county, a distance of about 134 miles.

## 720 ARRESTED IN ONE MONTH

Seven hundred and twenty persons were arrested by the Tacoma police department during the month of May, according to the report of Police Clerk Al Terry. Out of this number the central station handled 571. South Tacoma dragged in 123, Old Town got 22 and Bismarck had 4. The police auto patrol traveled 724 miles, made 22 hospital trips, and 20 trips to the county jail.

## FLEET OFFICERS ARRESTED FOR ROBBERY

YOKOHAMA, June 8.—Two officers and several enlisted men of the American Pacific fleet were arrested today and placed on the flagship Charleston, to await trial by court-martial, for the alleged theft of gun fittings and other equipment from the cruiser Denver, which they are said to have sold to Japanese second-hand dealers at this port. Pending a thorough investigation the departure of the fleet from Yokohama has been postponed.

## PERMITS ARE ISSUED FOR \$200,000 WORTH OF NEW BUILDINGS

# FALLS 200 FEET TO AWFUL DEATH

MINE SUPERINTENDENT DASHED DOWN OLD SHAFT—HEAD CRUSHED TO PULP.

(By United Press Leased Wire.) GOLDFIELD, Nev., June 8.—Frank A. Lucy, superintendent of the Consolidated Mining company, was killed yesterday by falling 200 feet down the shaft of the old Rolly workings.

Lucy was recently appointed to the superintendency of the Consolidated and was considered one of the best mining engineers in Nevada. He stepped on a rotten board near the mouth of the shaft and it gave way beneath his weight. His head was crushed beyond recognition by the fall.

## LAUGH IS ON H. A. RHODES

Friends of Henry A. Rhodes are having a good laugh at his expense over the election today for the charter revision committee.

Mr. Rhodes was the high man in the convention for the place on the committee, getting more votes than any other citizen. He was president of the City club, which was boosting the whole game of municipal government and he was one of the leaders in the commission plan movement, but now that the election is on he cannot even vote and has had to withdraw from the ticket.

Mr. Rhodes failed to register as a voter and this year has not participated in any of the five elections that have been already been held.

Mr. Rhodes is not eligible to serve on the charter committee, therefore, and he has withdrawn as a candidate and is urging his friends to vote for W. B. Kennell.

## WOULD TURN STREETS INTO PLAYGROUNDS
