The Art of Preserving Fruit BY AN EXPERT

BAKING JELLY, BLACKBERRY JAM AND JELLY PIE By Alice Mitchell Kirk In preserving, canning or jelly making, iron or tin utensils should never be used.

Boil rapidly 20 minutes, or until it jellies, when tried in a saucer. Pour into sterilized glasses, set in the sun until cool and cover with melted paraffine as for jelly. Cherry Pie. Make a plain paste of one-fourth cup of lard and butter, two cups of pastry flour, one-half teaspoonful of salt and one-half cup of very cold water.
