

CAN'T PUT BAN ON SEATTLE TO HAVE FIGHT AT THE FAIR REAL BALL PARK

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, July 28.—The Roller-Kaufman boxing exhibition, scheduled for Cort's arena next Friday night, may be held in spite of the ban placed on it by Sheriff Hodge. Hodge is in California, but sent a letter to President O'Brien, of the exposition, protesting against the boxing. This brought the arena management to the conclusion that it was useless to try to pull off the bout, but later events yesterday caused a change of sentiment. Prosecuting Attorney George Vanderveer says he does not think the proposed exhibition will come under the ban in the new criminal code which prohibits prize fights. He says he will have a new park on Fourteenth street, next year, and that it will be as long as the Tacoma park, but not quite as wide.
