

ASK DISBARMENT OF TACOMA ATTORNEY

LAWYERS FIND THAT DE WOLFE'S CHARGES AGAINST SUPREME COURT ARE WITHOUT FOUNDATION.

(By United Press Leased Wire.) ABERDEEN, July 30.—In its report today to the State Bar association the grievance committee recommended that a committee of three be appointed to start disbarment action against H. N. De Wolfe, the Tacoma attorney who filed charges against the supreme court.

His accusations are declared to be "without a shadow of justification" and the making of them "without any reasonable ground" is termed a "crime against the state and indicates a mind either grossly malicious or so recklessly irresponsible as to be unworthy of a position at the bar of the state."

QUAKE DOES GREAT DAMAGE IN MEXICO

(By United Press Leased Wire.) MEXICO CITY, July 30.—Two severe earthquakes shook Mexico City and vicinity today. The severest shock was registered at 4:15 a. m. Six persons were killed and a score severely injured.

Acapulco, on the west coast, is reported in ruins. Reports from other cities on the coast, and from this territory, are brief, though it has been ascertained that immense damage has been done in many localities.

Moody, general manager of the Chicago Association of Commerce, spent yesterday afternoon in Tacoma on a mission of apology for the apparent slur on the hospitality of the Northwest, which appeared in the Chicago Record-Herald following the recent trip of the Chicago association to this section.

Mr. Moody came all the way west to apologize and explain that the article was simply an unauthorized attempt at wit by the alleged humorist, Dick Little, of the Windy city. No one in Chicago took it seriously, he says.

Incidentally, Mr. Moody is preparing some matter for publication in the Record-Herald that will interest Tacomans. Secretary Sommers of the chamber of commerce has given Mr. Moody some valuable data concerning the history of Mount Tacoma, which he will have published, showing the true animus of the movement that seeks to overthrow the beautiful Indian name for this mountain and replace it with the name of a British admiral who never saw it and whose only notoriety came from having fought against the freedom of the colonies and for King George in the war of the revolution.
