PLAIN CAROMS. An illustration of the control of the cue ball by application of different forces and being struck one-quarter below the center, the object ball struck three-quarters right of center, is shown here. The four object balls show from left to right the effect of a medium, ordinary, hard and very hard stroke. Practice is necessary to properly gauge the strength. The force of the stroke controls the carom. When like positions are brought about in a game, the player will recognize the similarity and play the shot accordingly, if he practices the shots here shown.


