NEWCOMB LAYS BARE PLOT WHICH ENDED IN DEATH OF MARTIN KVALSHAUG

(Continued from Page One.) that he, Martin, her husband, must be put away—that is killed—and I must do it to marry her. I replied that I would as soon as possible and convenient.

Tried to Catch Wife. "The next meeting was Thursday, the 29th of April, 1909, at the Davenport hotel at about 2:30 p. m. until 4 p. m. We got a room together there. She said her husband was getting on to her relations with me and that he was getting home earlier at nights and tried to catch her. That he would try to get in before she could and question her about where she had been."

"Sooner the Better." "The next and last meeting was Friday, the 14th of May, at the Davenport hotel, from about 12:30 p. m. to 3 p. m. It was at this meeting that she wanted me to hurry and kill him and she told me he was getting hot on the trail, and I said I was ready to kill him at any time that was agreeable to her. She said, 'the sooner the better.' I asked her if she wanted it done before the next Thursday and she thought it would be better to wait until Thursday when she went to the theater with him, and when they came home I was to be in the woods, about two blocks from the house, and do the job, that is kill him.

Met at Dance. "Just about that time she spoke of a dance at Thirty-eighth and Yakima, which they were going to attend. She said he told her he would take her under these conditions: 'that she wouldn't dance with me.' I met her at the dance and talked with her and she said I would have to kill him right away, and not to wait until Thursday, the 20th of May. She said he had no gun. At that time it was about 1 o'clock at night. May the 14th, 1909. I left the hall, went home and changed my clothes, got the gun I had bought some back to Thirty-eighth and Yakima and took the last Puyallup car downtown, transferred to the cable and from there to Eleventh street car; got off at Twelfth street and Puget Sound avenue, walked about 150 yards down the path and waited for the next car that she and her husband were to come on.

Waited For Victim. "We had planned while at the dance that I was to be in the path some place. I waited until the car came on, stopped, and then I advanced towards Twelfth street. As they came in sight he stepped to the corner of the brush, she kept walking on. I walked on about 100 yards. In the meantime I passed her, and as I came along beside her she stopped and said: 'Give it to him.' "I paid no attention to what she said, but kept on going towards Kvalshaug. At that time his back was towards me. He turned around and just as he did I hit him with my right fist in the side of the jaw. I had the loaded gun in my left hand, out in the open. He fell from the blow and got up and jumped on me and we clinched and rolled around there in the bushes.

"When I struck him, and before he got up, I had changed the gun in my right hand. We were down on the ground and I had my gun in my right hand and pulled the trigger and shot him. Woman Fired Twice. "He then sort of jumped up and fell over. I got up and shot him again. He was then perhaps four feet from me. Then she came running up and said to me, 'Give it to him again.' I told her I would not. He was lying on the ground wriggling around. After I had shot him the second time I had thrown down my gun and she picked it up from where it was beside him (her husband) and fired it at him twice. She was very close to him. He was lying on the ground. She shot him in the face.

"I started towards town and saw her standing over the body. I then went down Twelfth street and met three men in a buggy and they asked me where the shooting

The defendants placed William J. Newcomb, father of the defendant, on the stand this afternoon as their first witness.

He began by reciting the early life of the defendant, telling of his peculiarities and when they were first noticed. Expert witnesses will be called late this afternoon. No night session will be held tonight.

Mrs. Kvalshaug on Stand. At 9 o'clock last evening, Mrs. Kvalshaug, who is Newcomb's co-defendant in the trial for the murder of the woman's husband, was led to the witness stand by a deputy sheriff. She sat with bowed head and talked without emotion, but clearly and emphatically.

Story of Murder. Her story as to the killing is in substance as follows: "My husband and I left the dance hall at a little after 11 o'clock. We took the car and got off at Puget Sound avenue and Twelfth street. When we started along the road through the woods, my husband stopped and when I asked him if I should wait, he said to go on. When I had walked only a few steps, I heard a sort of a thud and several shots. I could not tell how many. I screamed and ran back to where I had left Martin. He was lying on the ground and a man was standing over him. As the man ran toward Twelfth street, I saw that it was Charles Newcomb. "Then I picked up Martin's hat and laid it on his breast and ran home as fast as I could."

Plot Hinted At. Several witnesses on the stand yesterday afternoon told of Newcomb's confession made in the office of Chief of Police Duley on the morning following the murder. The only contradiction between the woman's statement and that of Newcomb is that the latter charges her with having originated the plot and that she fired two of the shots into the prostrate body of her husband. She declared that when Newcomb swore that he would kill her husband she cautioned him not to talk that way. On the other hand, Newcomb stated that the woman had declared that something must be done to get her husband out of the way.

The attorneys for the defendant offered little objection to the questions put to the woman and only asked a very few questions in cross-examination.
