

# GREAT FAIR TO CLOSE TONIGHT

### Brilliant Fireworks and Music Will Mark the Last Hours of the A.-Y.-P. Expo.

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Oct. 16.—With the firing of a farewell salute of 21 guns by a crew from the government life-saving station and the singing of "Auld Lang Syne" by a chorus of thousands in the natural amphitheater, the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition will pass into history on the stroke of 12 tonight.

The closing hours of the exposition will be made the occasion for merrymaking. Brilliant fireworks and music by many bands will prove a gorgeous spectacle.

Band Serenades Buildings. The closing ceremonies began this afternoon when the official exposition band serenaded all of the principal buildings on the grounds. The evening will be given over to various celebrations along the Pay Streak and elsewhere. The closing exercises will be held in the natural amphitheater, the concluding feature of which will be a farewell speech by President Chilberg. As the president finishes his remarks he will turn a switch which will extinguish the exposition lights promptly at midnight.

Will Blow Taps. In the darkness a bugler will blow "taps," the audience will sing "Auld Lang Syne," and the fair will be over.

While the grounds will be open for a short time after today, the show will end tonight.

The total attendance at the exposition, not including today, is 2,677,799, a daily average of 26,842.

# FIREMAN BURNED TO DEATH



# President Greeted President In Historic Meeting Today



(Continued From Page One.) by a blaze of officers in gold lace, himself wearing a uniform gorgeous with the precious metal and glittering orders, was met at the American approach to the international boundary by Secretary of War Dickinson, Brigadier-General Meyer and Governor Campbell of Texas.

General Meyer, commanding the department of Texas, had brought artillery, two squadrons of the Third cavalry and the entire Ninth artillery.

Soldiers Surround Spot. Artillery and cavalry soldiers were drawn up around the spot where General Diaz alighted from his carriage to receive the formal greetings of Secretary Dickinson, acting as the personal representative of President Taft.

After being welcomed to the country by Secretary Dickinson Diaz was welcomed in the name of the state of Texas by Governor Campbell and to the city of El Paso by the mayor.

Play "La Paloma." The cavalry band then struck up "La Paloma," the soldiers forming themselves into an escort of honor, and while the artillery's cannon boomed out 21 guns the Mexican executive was given a smart pace to the house where President Taft was awaiting him, the following order being maintained: Brigadier General Meyer and staff; one squadron of cavalry; President Diaz' carriage and personal escort of President Diaz; the governor of Texas and staff; one squadron of cavalry; the field artillery.

Infantry was drawn up about the house, where the meeting of the presidents took place and, when General Diaz arrived, came to salute.

Captain Archibald W. Butt, the military aide of President Taft, emerged from the house as the brilliant entourage arrived on the block, and escorted President Diaz from his carriage to the presence of the president of the United States.


Standing directly behind President Taft as the introductions were made, were Postmaster General Hitchcock, Secretary Nagel of the department of commerce and labor and Secretary Dickinson.

Grasps Diaz' Hand Warmly. President Taft grasped President Diaz' hand warmly, told him how glad he was to welcome him in the name of the people of the United States, and expressed the hope that the cordial relations that have existed for so many years between the two great republics of the western hemisphere will continue for ages to come.

President Diaz, who speaks English with fluency and accuracy, replied in a similar happy diplomatic vein.

After all the members of the Mexican president's staff had been formally presented and the speeches, previously exchanged between the foreign offices of the two powers and O. K'd by each, had been delivered, the two presidents had a friendly chat over a light luncheon of sandwiches and champagne.

If Presidents Taft and Diaz took up any of the international border troubles in their little talk with the stenographers present did not record the conversation.

The first interview lasted only a few minutes. President Diaz then made his formal adieu and was escorted back to the international boundary in the same manner in which he had come.

Taft Goes to Mexico. Half an hour later, or shortly before noon, President Taft emerged from his temporary residence, crossed the international boundary and was received in his turn by President Diaz. As the Mexican chief had left his soldiers on his side of the river when he came a visiting the United States, so President Taft dropped his military escort at the bridge approach and rode over the Rio Grande accompanied only by his military aids, Captain Butt.

The ceremonies in Juarez were practically identical with those in El Paso, except that instead of receiving the official respects of General Diaz, Mr. Taft paid his own. The banquet to be given President Taft by President Diaz in Juarez tonight is to be the most costly and elaborate ever given in the north of Mexico. The priceless Maximilian china set, which is one of the most famous possessions of the Mexican government, will be used.

After his meeting with President Diaz, President Taft will be the guest of honor at a luncheon given by the business men of El Paso.

# VOTER NEED NOT TELL HIS POLITICS

## REGISTRY PROVISION IN NEW PRIMARY LAW OVERTURNED BY COURT.

(By United Press Leased Wire.) OLYMPIA, Oct. 16.—The provision of the new primary election law which requires voters on registering to declare their party affiliation was held null and void by Superior Judge Mitchell, of this county, yesterday afternoon, in a test case brought by the attorney general.

The court held that the section of the primary law attempted to repeal by implication an earlier law, and, further, that the provision was not covered by the title of the primary act, and was therefore unconstitutional. The case will be taken at once to the supreme court on a writ of review.
