

Boy Dies From Wound Inflicted By Mother

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 25.—Lewellyn Cushman, 14 years of age, died today from the effects of a shot fired by his mother, Mrs. E. L. Cushman. Mrs. Cushman is a widow.

Mrs. Cushman and her son were hunting in the Antelope valley, nearly 100 miles from Los Angeles, late yesterday. The lad was walking in front of his mother, when the gun she carried was discharged accidentally. The charge entered his left leg below the knee.

Leaving the boy lying in a field, the grief-crazed mother ran two miles to a ranch house, where she procured an automobile. Lewellyn was brought to Los Angeles in the car and taken to the California hospital. Although the doctors worked determinedly all night to save his life he had lost so much blood from the terrible wound in his leg that recovery was impossible. He died early today.

Mrs. Cushman collapsed when she was told of her son's death. She is in a precarious condition at the hospital.

Englishmen Far Superior to Americans, Says Mrs. Atherton

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—"American men lack subtlety and finesse. If I were to marry again, it would be an Englishman," was the declaration of Mrs. Gertrude Atherton today while discussing the "old maid" stigma. Mrs. Atherton is a widow.

"The American woman has surpassed the American man," she continued. "She has learned things and forged ahead with tremendous mental speed, while her husband has utterly failed to do this in other than business ways."

"Yes, were I to marry (although I shall not, for my profession makes my habits and home unpermanent), it would be an Englishman, for he is far and away the most interesting type of the genus homo."

"Do you know that barley water has taken the place of liquor here and in London and in many other places?"

"Of course this statement is only partially true, but it is certain that drinking in the better classes in this country as well as in England has become less in the last few years. This I firmly believe is directly the result of the woman's campaign."

"Woman has reconstructed herself now and she takes an intelligent interest in politics. At any rate the campaign of the Suffragettes has been instrumental in keeping from the bridge tables many women who have found excitement in other things."

Out in 15 Below Temperature In Nighties Fleeing from Fire

C., Feb. 25.—Four men are suffering from serious injuries today and others are recovering from exposure to 15 below zero temperature as a result of the burning of the Hazelton hotel, at Hazelton, B. C., yesterday. All the guests were completely cut off from exits and jumped from upper windows in their night gowns. Angus McLean, Dick Jones, Peter Enech and the Chinese cook were injured, the latter fatally. The hotel was a three-story wooden structure and the loss is in excess of \$25,000.

LA FOLLETTE DECLARES SENATE INVESTIGATION IS MERELY A FRAMEUP

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 25.—The charge that the senatorial investigation of the causes for the high cost of living is merely a "frame-up" is made by Senator La Follette's Weekly, published today. An editorial in the paper says that the investigation is designed to furnish material to be used in denunciation of the so-called Aldrich-Cannon alliance.

The paper declares that public sentiment has turned against the republican machine and that the Aldrich-Cannon sentiment is adopting measures that are heroic, if not desperate.

REGISTRATION BOOKS WILL BE IN SOUTH TACOMA TOMORROW

Registration books will be sent to South Tacoma tomorrow. All day and as late in the evening as is necessary the books will be kept there, and there will be no excuse for any of the South Tacoma voters not registering.

The books were sent to Fern Hill last week, but the response was very light. Including all that had registered before the total registration Saturday night in this precinct was but 220.

The total in the city at the present time is about 12,000. There are but two weeks more in which to register.

TROOPS HOLD STRIKERS IN CHECK

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Feb. 25.—Although a general strike of union men here, in sympathy with the street railway employees who are fighting the company, appeared remote today, the question will be settled finally next Sunday at a great mass meeting of unionists.

The presence of armed men along the lines of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company prevented any semblance of riot and more cars were operated today by the company than at any time since the strike began.

No disturbance of any magnitude were reported, and the indications today are that the authorities will be able to hold the situation in hand with the forces already on duty.

A few of the more hot-headed strikers still continue to urge a general strike, but a majority of the car men are said to oppose the plan.

The first semblance of disturbance came shortly before noon when a crowd of men and boys attacked a car. They were charged by police and state constabulary, and several rioters sustained minor injuries. One policeman was seriously wounded.

SPRECKLES TO GIVE \$100,000 TO EXPOSITION

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 25.—San Diegans are elated today over the prospects of raising the \$1,000,000 necessary to secure the completion of the Panama canal in 1915. It was announced today that John D. Spreckels has subscribed \$100,000 to the fund. The amount now pledged is \$755,000.

The promoters of the project are confident that the remaining money will be forthcoming immediately. They say that several corporations have been waiting to note the size of Spreckels' donation before announcing their own gifts. The management believes the entire sum will be pledged within a week.

SUIT ON BIG ESTATE STARTS IN COURT HERE

Friendly suit by William Vilan Hanks and Sybil Anna Hanks, minor heirs of the late Senator William F. Vilas of Wisconsin, who left an estate worth \$2,000,000, of which over \$200,000 is in this section, yesterday started suit in court here to contest the will and to quiet title to property in this state.

The question involved is whether the Wisconsin law governing bequests hold concerning property in this state.

The will of Senator Vilas was a complicated affair and after many conditional bequests it leaves a large share of the estate to the University of Wisconsin.

The attorney general of Wisconsin will come to Tacoma to try the case on behalf of the state when it comes up.

MADRIZ FLEES FROM THE CAPITAL

Residents of Eastern Nicaragua are demanding of the administration that peace be declared and General Estrada be recognized as president.

Rejoicing here among the revolutionist sympathizers gives the town a holiday appearance. All stores are closed and the streets are filled with rejoicing throngs while the flags of Nicaragua appear on all sides.

News of further fighting arrived here after the city had spent a night in jubilation over what was believed to be a complete victory for the insurgents.

CAPTURE LEADER OF ALLEGED OPIUM GANG

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 25.—After a desperate struggle with the Arizona territorial officials, a man, who they believe is Chick Wallace, alleged leader of a gang organized to smuggle opium into the United States, is in jail today at Prescott, Ariz., according to a dispatch received at the sheriff's office in this city.

The man, who declares his name is John Oliver, was arrested late last evening in Williams, Ariz. He was taken to Prescott and lodged in the Yavapai county jail.

Wallace is the reputed leader of the gang that has been successfully smuggling opium into San Francisco for the last eight months. He also is alleged to have been the brains of an organization for the illegal importation of Chinese.

The officials say that the power of the organization will be effectively broken with the capture of the leaders.
