POOR PROTECTION FOR COAST THIS SUMMER

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—Indications are that the Pacific coast will be poorly protected by a battleship patrol during the coming summer and fall. Four warships now on the coast will be detailed to South America to participate in the international celebration to be held at Valparaiso.

In addition all available gunboats will be stationed along the Central American coast during the summer on account of internal disturbances in the Central American republics.

MORMON LEADER IS CALLED IN TRUST INVESTIGATION

SALT LAKE, Utah, April 2.—Subpoenas were served today on President Joseph Smith of the Mormon church, David Eccles, presiding bishop; C. W. Nibley, Thomas H. Cutter and H. G. Whitney, directors of various sugar companies in Utah and Idaho, to appear before the grand jury in Pueblo, Col., April 7, to testify in the government investigation of the sugar trust. They are expected to describe the operations of the alleged combinations throughout the West.




