Light and gas bills have been low. The expense of clothing has been reduced to a minimum. All the time we were having our experiences in home-making, Constance was studying the reduction of housekeeping expenses. Throw nothing away is her solution.

We have been guided in part by considering the habits of our thrifty, foreign-born population. We knew the Italians, for instance, lived at slight expense principally on macaroni. We chose spaghetti. Constance takes a few cents worth of this toothsome paste, bakes it, highly seasoned, with milk, cheese and tomatoes, and one baking forms our chief dish for three meals. We have oatmeal—a good old Scotch dish—every breakfast. But we do not buy the package brands. We buy rolled oats in bulk, six pounds for 25 cents. Irish stew is another of our favorite viands.



This winter, averaging 50 cents below any other bill that comes to the building. Constance has taught me to wear things that have been fixed over. So now I cheerfully get my hats cleaned and reblocked, my shoes half soled, my clothing repaired. Before I was married I had a false sense of shame to do such things. But when the girl a fellow has courted tells him he looks just as well in repaired clothing as in new, he is apt to believe it.

As for Constance's clothing—I don't know how she does it, but she buys less than I do, but always has more and better-looking clothes than I have. She has taught herself to be an expert needlewoman. Each spring and fall she patronizes a "sewing school," paying \$5 for 10 all-day "lessons." The "school" simply amounts to this: The "pupils" make their own clothes under the critical direction of expert dress-makers—the "teachers." This spring Constance is adjusting to the present styles two old suits of hers, buying, perhaps, \$5 worth of materials—cost of the two new suits, \$10. She expects to take a second term of "lessons" and make herself a number of summer frocks.

Neckties are an expense to any young fellow who must appear moderately well-dressed on his job. Ties are costly, and they soon grow dirty. But mine do longer service than most. For Constance rips them up, washes them, turns them inside out, stitches them up again, and their second life is usually longer than their first.


