

WOMAN CHARGES FRAUD IN HER MARRIAGE

They were married May 29, 1909, and live at Spanaway, where Lambert formerly owned a livery stable.

Earth Will Be 14,000,000 Miles From That Comet

(By United Press Leased Wire.) BERKELEY, Cal., May 6.—First authentic calculations as to the distance the tail of Halley's comet will extend beyond the earth when the sphere passes through it on May 18, was made public today at the student observatory, University of California.

The length of the tail is estimated at 15,000,000 miles. The earth will pass through the tail at a distance of 14,000,000 miles from the comet.

DECIDE TO FILL THE GULCH

In five minutes this morning the commission did what the city and wrangling over for the last two years—they decided to fill up Tacoma avenue under the gulch bridge and to build a bridge over the Puyallup river at Eleventh street.

City Engineer Raleigh has been working on both plans, but could never get any action by the old council. He presented the facts to the commission this morning, and it took the five men just about five minutes to settle the matter.

Everybody admitted the thing to do at Puyallup avenue was to build a big elevator bridge, and the engineer was instructed to get busy at once on plans.

It will cost probably \$140,000. Of this \$75,000 is in the bridge fund now and the rest will be raised by the next tax levy.

On the Tacoma avenue bridge it was generally agreed that this should be filled up. The old bridge there is about gone, and a new wooden one will be built for service while the filling is being done.

The engineer submitted estimates showing it will cost \$5,000 for a culvert of reinforced concrete in the bottom of the gulch, \$18,000 for an arch over the N. P. railway, and then there will be about 250,000 yards of fill. It is expected the whole job can be done for less than a steel bridge can be built. The steel bridge would cost \$85,000 without street car tracks or \$100,000 if made strong enough for cars.

MOB SURROUNDS INDIANS

LAKEPORT, Cal., May 6.—Two Indians suspected of participation in the killing of Sheriff Kemp, of Lake county, were surrounded this afternoon by sheriff's posses in a thicket near the Scott's valley schoolhouse. It is believed that the Indians are heavily armed and will fight to the death rather than surrender.

STR. VENTURA IS SAFE

SEATTLE, May 6.—A dispatch to the Merchants' Exchange here says that the British ship Ventura bound from Glasgow to Victoria, has arrived at Punta Arenas, Chile, after having been ashore in the Straits of Magellan. The Ventura lost two propeller blades.

NO TRACE OF MISSING MAN

John Brendsel, the millworker who mysteriously disappeared Sunday, has not been located up to the present time. Friends of the man at Mount Vernon have been communicated with, but they say they know nothing of his whereabouts.

The police are investigating the case, and the evidence of foul play is growing stronger.

NERVY THIEF GETS LOOT ESCAPING

BIRMINGHAM, May 6.—Driven from one house he was attempting to enter a thief last night abstracted a pair of trousers containing a few dollars in money from the window of another nearby as he sped down the street. Early this morning a neighbor saw the fellow attempting to pry up a window of the E. C. Schumacher home on High street. She notified the Schumachers by telephone and the thief, hearing a noise inside, fled. But not to be done out of his loot, as he passed the house next door, he glanced in the window, saw a pair of trousers hanging on a chair within reach and snatched them as he fled by.


