To make the joke good, Harry Whitney Trent, who was on the box, called up Chief of Police Wappenstein, who gave the news to the newspapers. The police hurried patrolmen to the scene in an automobile with a load of newspapermen flying close behind.

KILLS WIFE AND SELF

Edgar Acetta, a singer, who sued the woman for breach of promise and later compromised the suit, has been arrested pending the investigation. He declared that he came to Chicago recently at Miss Stelle's request.

MORMONS LOSE BIG HOTEL

Dr. Martin started with the body, but stopped at Kansas City and came home. Much feeling over the death and his actions afterward arose.
