

INSANITY TO BE CHARLTON'S PLEA

(Continued From Page One.)
his return for trial. The attorneys for the defense and the grief-stricken father of the young man say that he was. The father brings forward irrational letters to prove the assertion.
Captain Scott, brother of the dead woman, says that he "was not." He also has letters written by Charlton to him in the happy honeymoon days at Villa Legnazzi on the shores of Lake Como, which, he declares, prove that Charlton was in his right mind.
Still Loves Wife He Murdered.
Charlton professes that he still loves his dead wife. He cherishes a few rings and jewels that she wore as mementoes of his first few weeks of happiness with her beside the Italian lake.
Yet he calmly discussed the details of his attack on his wife, of her death and of his attempts to hide the body.

The new-found attorneys for the defense have intimated that they will set up an insanity plea to clear Charlton of responsibility. J. Fred Clarke and former State Attorney Edwards of Jersey City, counsel for Charlton, today ordered that no more interviews be allowed to see the accused youth.
In the meantime alienists for the state will examine Charlton to test the young man's sanity.
Attorneys familiar with Italian law assert that Charlton, if extradited, could not be convicted of any crime but that of manslaughter. The penalty for that crime in Italy is six years' imprisonment. This, in the case of Charlton, would be tantamount to death sentence, as the youth is a victim of tuberculosis in an advanced stage.

Watched During Night.
Charlton was watched throughout the night for fear that he might commit suicide. The heat disturbed him and he was exceedingly nervous. He spent much of the time talking with his guards. He fell asleep about 1 o'clock and awoke at 5 hungry. After eating ham, eggs, rolls and coffee, he asked for more to eat. After breakfast he had a shower bath, dressed and read everything in the papers concerning his arrest.
He was arraigned before Recorder McGovern this morning. The recorder adjourned the preliminary hearing until next Tuesday at the request of Charlton's attorneys, who said that they were not sufficiently familiar with the case to warrant an immediate examination.

Charlton was taken from the court room and will be removed to the Jersey county jail. Judge Charlton arrived today, bringing with him two letters written by his son in Italy. The missives were incoherent and peculiar.
Believes Son Insane.
"I have convincing proof that my son was insane," said Judge Charlton, "from the fact that he reached here in the manner in which he did. That action alone shows that he is not responsible. There are no sense in many of his statements. Why, when he was told that I was coming here, he said, 'how flattering.'"

Father Furnished Money.
"It is not true that Porter's wife furnished the money for the Italian trip. I supplied the money."
It became known here today that Judge Charlton met his son's wife and questioned her regarding her past life. It is said they quarreled and that was the reason the Charltons went abroad.
On the other hand, Captain Scott says that the letters in his possession show coherence. He insists that the Charltons lived at Moltrasio on money Mrs. Charlton received from Neville Castle, her first husband, in lieu of alimony. Arrangements have been made for the burial of Mrs. Charlton in the Scott family plot in a cemetery near San Francisco.

MCGRAW FUNERAL TOMORROW

SEATTLE, June 24.—The funeral of John H. McGraw, second governor of the state of Washington will be held from the family home at 2 o'clock this afternoon. At the request of the dead man, the funeral will be limited to members of the family and intimate friends. The body will be cremated.

Gov. McGraw died at 7 o'clock last night, after a long, hard fight against death. McGraw left home when 17 years of age. He became a clerk in a country store, then became its proprietor. In the panic of 1873, he failed, and came west, driving a horse car in San Francisco for some time. He drifted to Seattle, and in turn became a hotel clerk, hotel proprietor, policeman, city marshal, chief of police, ward boss, sheriff, bank president, governor, and finally a prominent retired businessman.

McGraw was born in Penobscot county, Maine, in 1850.

IN THE PUBLIC EYE

About the busiest man in Indiana is S. C. Dickey, of Winona Lake and Indianapolis. Rev. Mr. Dickey is the general manager of the Winona assembly and schools, the biggest interdenominational summer resort in the country.

In addition to being the general manager of this resort, Dr. Dickey is the president of the Winona college of agriculture, the Winona Park school for girls, the Winona academy of music and is general director of the Winona bible conference, which attracts 10,000 to 15,000 ministers to the lake each summer, as well as postmaster of the town of Winona.
Until the last month or so Dr. Dickey was also the president of the Winona technical schools at Indianapolis and the Winona interurban railway company. Owing to a press of all his other duties, however, Dr. Dickey was compelled to resign the latter positions. With his resignation the interurban company passed into other hands, and now, for the first time in the history of the road, cars are being operated upon it on Sundays.

Dr. Dickey is an ordained Presbyterian minister and frequently preaches, not only at Winona, Lake, but at other points over Indiana, Ohio and other states.
