### GARFIELD HAS PRAISE FOR INSURGENTS

Garfield, former secretary of the interior, today discussed the treatment of conservation measures. Ballinger's withdrawal bill was inadequate as it was presented to congress, Garfield said. ### WILL REVIVE THE WHITE RIVER CASE



The United States government refused to interfere in the case and urged the local authorities to go to the state courts for relief and they are going to do it. Local commercial organizations and the valley farmers will cooperate in pressing suit against King county to get the dam removed from the river so the White river waters may resume their former normal course.

### RUBE WADDELL SIGNS THE PLEDGE FOR ONE YEAR

LOUIS, June 27.—The slants of justice "broke right" for Rube Waddell, some-time ball player today when he was released on probation after having been charged with drunkenness and wife beating. Rube affixed his rambling signature to a year's contract with the court in which he promised to abstain from intoxicants and agreed to "report progress" to the police three times a week or write the judge weekly regarding his pledge. Mrs. Waddell still holds the serve clause over Waddell and will give him another chance to make good. She said that no divorce is in sight as yet but that if Rube misbehaves again she will ask "walvers" and give him an unconditional release.

### FIND BODY OF TACOMA DOCTOR; SUICIDE

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 27.—The partly decomposed body of Captain Andrew Miller of Tacoma was found near the marine ways at North Island, Coronado, yesterday with a revolver clutched tightly in his hand, showing he had committed suicide. ### AMERICAN COURT MARTIALED BY PRESIDENT MADRIZ

BLUEFIELDS, June 27.—Wm. Pittman, the American engineer captured by the Madriz forces at the battle of Bluefields Bluff, was courtmartialed and convicted today of conspiracy against the Nicaraguan government. He probably will be sentenced to at least ten years imprisonment.

The Washington authorities will be asked to interfere with the sentencing of Pittman on the ground that the sentence practically would be a death sentence. Pittman has incurred the bitter hatred of the administration because of his activity in the revolutionary campaign. ### Thrilling Work Taking Census In Alaska

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, June 27.—Dr. C. D. Scott, census enumerator for the district of Kuskokwim, Alaska, is in the city, with the completed count of his 5,000 miles of territory, which he will forward to Washington at once. Scott arrived on the steamer Senator from Nome yesterday. To gather the figures of the 1910 census, Dr. Scott traveled 5,000 miles in the dead of winter by dog sledge, through the wildest and most unsettled country in the North. At one point it seemed impossible to go forward, while to remain idle meant death. His native guide and dog driver refused to go any farther at the end of the second day of a blizzard. Strapping his guide to the sledge and urging his dogs, the doctor finally the end of the fifth day of the storm. The team had had nothing to eat during the entire five days and collapsed when shelter was reached. Dr. Scott has spent 12 years in Alaska and in his professional calls has become inured to the fearful hardships of the North.
