

SEND GUNBOAT TO NICARAGUA

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 WASHINGTON, D. C., July 16.—It was announced at the state department today that steps will be taken at once to protect William Pittman and Dr. Lawrence Burghelm, prisoners of President Madriz in Nicaragua. The announcement was made after a telephone conference today with President Taft at Beverly.

MANAGUA, July 16.—It is reported that the American gunboat Vicksburg has been ordered from Panama to an Juan del Sur to protect American interests and influence the attitude of Madriz toward William Pittman, the American prisoner of war.

Strike May Be Settled Monday

 PHILADELPHIA, July 16.—After a morning during which it seemed likely that the threatened strike of the Pennsylvania railroad trainmen and conductors would be called before night, the officers of the company unexpectedly made another peace move shortly after noon. General Manager Myers of the Pennsylvania company invited Presidents Garretson of the conductors and Lee of the trainmen and the presidents of other organizations to a conference Monday. It is believed that a final discussion of the demands the men have made will take place at the conference.

TAFT WILL TRY TO RUN HIS PARTY

 BEVERLY, Mass., July 16.—Pursuant to intimations that President Taft is preparing to assume active leadership of the republican party in the coming senatorial campaign without waiting for anybody's "O. K.," Wade H. Ellis and Senator Dick of Ohio are here and other Ohio politicians are en route to coax the president to enter the Ohio campaign at once.

Ellis bears the draft of a platform he expects the republican state convention to adopt. It endorses Taft, the Aldrich tariff law and other measures attacked by the insurgents. Ellis and Dick will confer with the president this afternoon and tomorrow.

Senator Burton of Ohio probably will attend tomorrow's conference.

Indications point to Representative Nicholas Longworth as republican nominee for governor of Ohio.

Father of Twelve in Politics on the Anti-Race Suicide Platform

ALAMEDA, July 16.—There's no race suicide in the family of P. F. Cavanaugh of this city, who is running as an independent candidate for the state senate. And it's on that very point that Cavanaugh is making his race for office.

Cavanaugh is a painter by trade and the stork has visited his domicile 13 times and 12 of the children are living. At the last legislature Cavanaugh sought to have introduced a bill which would pension, or otherwise signify honor, the mother of a dozen or more children, but he was laughed down. Now he's going to the legislature himself as a member if the voters of his district give the word.

Cavanaugh is making his campaign on the plea that unless the American people produce more children the state will be overrun with Japs, Hindus, Chinese and other undesirable, and that in time the yellow races will control the coast to the exclusion of whites. He has a special line of legislation in contemplation to give the white man a better chance to raise big families as of old and on the anti-race suicide, anti-Asiatic program he hopes to be watted into office.

"American children," he says, "are the wards of American citizenship. In them are the future hopes and aspirations of this nation. We should create and preserve a condition under which they will have an opportunity to earn a decent living, but if this condition of Oriental invasion continues to be a system, wherein they must struggle for existence, our indifference will be the direct cause of their degradation and consequent decline of American ideals."

"The attention of the public must be drawn to the fact that the question of Asiatic immigration and labor must be settled in favor of the white man and his children."

Cavanaugh is distributing cards containing a declaration of his principles together with a picture of his large family, the latter just to prove that he is doing his share to populate the state with sturdy Californians. Mrs. Cavanaugh is a native daughter of California, and just as proud of her numerous progeny as is her husband.
