

# CRIPPEN SAFE IN A TINY REPUBLIC

(By United Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, July 22.—Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, the American dentist whom the police charge with having murdered his wife at their Islington home, is today hiding in the Andorra republic, in the Pyrennes, according to a dispatch received here.

If these reports are true, the police say, their chances for arresting Crippen are greatly reduced. The Andorra republic observes practically no rules of extradition, and criminals who have fled to its fastnesses seldom have been captured, so long as they remained within the confines of the republic.

The whole republic covers an area of only 175 miles, but practically every foot of the territory is suited for hiding. The republic has been independent since the regime of Charlemagne. Communication with the outside world has been limited, and the inhabitants always have shown an unwillingness to surrender foreign criminals.

# HEBB PLANT WON'T AFFECT CITY DOCK

Messrs. Rodgers, Harmon, Day, Love, Younglove and Grinnell of the business men's committee called on Mayor Fawcett and Commissioners Lawson and Woods this morning to urge the municipal dock proposition and to insist that the Hebb power plant project should not interfere. They were shown that the power plant project had no bearing on the case, and it was agreed that a telegram should be sent to Thomas Cooper at St. Paul urging speedy consideration, as the city wants to get busy on the dock yet this summer, to have it operating by next year at least.

The committee was afraid if the city sold bonds for the power plant that there would not be enough to get the docks without exceeding the bond limit. It was pointed out by Commissioners Woods and Lawson that the Hebb power plant proposition will not affect the bonded debt of the city. If this is gone into it will be simply like a private corporation would do it. The city will own the plant, but all the money put in will be simply on bonds on the plant itself, and the plant will have to take care of its own cost. Not a dollar is to be paid out of the city taxes on the project.

The city is simply going to play the game of modern finance and have the bondholders build it a plant which will pay for itself and then be the property of the city without costing the people anything.  
This will leave all the taxing power available to build municipal docks and care for the other city expenses.

### TEXAS HAS A POINDEXTER TOO

DALLAS, Tex., July 22.—The final spellbinding of the Texas democratic primary campaign ends today. Tomorrow the polls open for the party primaries and a thousand democratic speakers in automobiles are hustling through the state in behalf of their respective candidates.  
The most general prediction is that W. C. Poindexter, a friend of Senator Bailey, probably will be nominated for governor. There are three other candidates for the nomination.  
Frank G. Abell, a photographer in the President building, died at his rooms at the Stathart hotel yesterday with heart collapse after a week's illness, aged 68. He leaves a widow and a son and daughter by a former marriage. He was president of the Photographers' association of the Northwest.

# English Don't Know The Real King George

(The following is a digest of an article entitled "King George the Fifth," written by Mr. Brooks for the August McClures.—Editor.)

England is looking for the man behind George V, but she has yet to find him. It has come upon Englishmen with almost a shock to realize how little they know of the sovereign who has been called to reign over them.

When it came to dealing with King George as a man, the London journals presented to the world a sort of paragon in wax, a monster of humdrum respectability, a desiccated effigy of the conventional qualities, talents and graces, a dehumanized dummy of decorous commonplaceness, a constitutional automaton, a rigid pattern-plate of the proprieties.

Such a picture bears no more resemblance to King George as I have heard him described by those who really know him than it bears to Mr. Roosevelt.

Let me recall the outward aspects and incidents of his life. Prince George was doubly fortunate. Not only was he a younger son, and so with comparative liberty to follow his own tastes, but his tastes led him to the most wholesome and bracing vocation that an English prince could pos-

sibly adopt.  
King Edward was a believer in the virtues of "cockpit education." He was determined, if his sons showed any liking for the sea, to place them on board the Britannia. The two princes joined her at the same moment. No indulgences were allowed them except separate cabins. Prince George took to the life readily and easily. The two years he spent on board ship confirmed his liking for a sailor's life.

A catalogue of journeys and places is hardly a sketch of a man's personality. Still it is worth noting that before he was twenty years old Prince George had seen more of the outside world than most men see in a lifetime.  
After making due allowances for the note of exaggeration that Englishmen rarely escape in talking of princes, there remains a consensus of opinion that this particular prince was not only a hard-working, willing, and really capable sailor, but a kindly, unaffected, good-hearted gentleman.

A constant, at times perhaps almost a morbid, sense of duty is one of the qualities King George owes to, or that was at any rate confirmed by, his naval training. He is one of the most conscientious men living.

There simply is not an ounce of wickedness in him," remarked to me one who observed the new sovereign at close range.  
The king is a thoroughly human man, with pronounced traits and plenty of opinions of his own. King George has no more hesitation than Mr. Roosevelt in saying out precisely what he thinks. He is a straightforward, down-to-earth style of man, rather naive and immature, but a volume of speech, with an element of emotionalism that, unlike most Englishmen, he is at no pains to conceal.

England does not know the king. Does the king know England? Has he that instinct for divining the silent thoughts and wishes of the nation that King Edward showed to perfection? Has he inherited his father's royal gift for doing the right thing at the right moment in the right way? I do not know; I doubt whether anybody knows.  
But, if he relies upon his own sound instincts and goes straight ahead, all will be well. He may never be as popular as King Edward, but he will be assured of the respect, confidence and devotion that are never likely to be withheld by Englishmen from a king who means so thoroughly well as this one does, whose sense of responsibility is so static, and who will gladly wear himself to the bone in doing his duty.
