GREEN RIVER SPRINGS HOTEL BURNS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) HOT SPRINGS, Aug. 20.—Fire spreading from burning timber at 8 o'clock last night destroyed the Hot Springs hotel and plant on the line of the Northern Pacific, King county, causing a loss estimated at \$35,000, with an insurance of approximately \$10,000.

Green River Hot Springs until last Monday has been under the proprietorship of Dr. J. S. Kloeber. On that day he turned over

the plant to North Yakima interests for a consideration of \$145,000.

Although a number of patients were in the hotel at the time, no lives were lost and no injuries are reported.

Forest fires have been burning in the vicinity for several days but no apprehension was felt. A change in the direction of the wind last night carried burning brands onto the buildings.

VERA PROSSER GIVES LONG THE CREDIT

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Aug. 20.—Freed of the charge of killing her husband, Mrs. Vera Prosser, with a party of Seattle witnesses at her trial, arrived here this morning from Libby, Montana.

"I expected nothing but acquittal," she said at the Union station. "No jury could have convicted me, in the face of the testimony introduced by my attorney, State Senator Long. It is to him that I owe the most. Next come the people of the little town of Libby, who both befriended and defended me at all times."

A dispatch from Libby today states that Senator Long broke down after the trial, and his dramatic denunciation of the character of the murdered man, and is under the care of physicians today.

British ship Dalgouair is the first of the spot grain charters for the season fixed by Balfour, Guthrie & Co. to carry wheat from Tacoma to the United Kingdom in the early fleet.

Carrying a cargo of general freight and a big list of passengers the steamer Buckman, of the Alaska-Pacific Steamship line, left yesterday for Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The Kosmos liner Scarpis will arrive next week from the West Coast and Hamburg. She has cargo from the West Coast for Tacoma and will load a large shipment of lumber, flour and general freight for the West Coast and Hamburg.

The Pacific Coast Steamship company's City of Puebla is due today from San Francisco and Los Angeles with a cargo of general freight.

With freight and passengers from Tacoma and other Sound ports, the steamer Watson arrived yesterday at Los Angeles.

Carrying a large cargo of general freight the Osaka Shoshen Kaisha liner Seattle Maru, leaves today for the Orient.

Under charter to W. R. Grace & Co., the British steamer Bramley arrived last night from Powell river, where she has been discharging cement cargo. She has a part cargo of ore for the Tacoma smelter and a part cargo of pitrate for the Dupont Powder works.
