

UNCLE SAM'S NEW PROCESS HAND LAUNDRY! FAMILY MONEY WASHED WHILE YOU WAIT




The upper picture to the left shows the washing tank, with the bills in wire trays to prevent sticking together. Below is the sizing vat, where bills are "starched," and to the right is shown the ironing machine, from which paper money emerges "good as new."

If some paper lucre you carried was really too filthy to keep company with a man who takes a bath every day, and you slipped it through the "receiving" window, what would happen to it? It would be sent to the laundry! That's what Uncle Sam does with all the really "filthy lucre" from Tacoma.
 Suppose you threw away all your shirts as soon as they became soiled the first time. Pretty expensive, eh? Uncle Sam found out that about our paper money. It costs \$13.50 per thousand to manufacture and put into circulation and the average dollar note is returned to the treasury for redemption 14 months after it is issued. Most of the notes sent to the treasury for redemption are not so worn but that they would be fit for circulation if the dirt and germs were taken out.
 Director Ralph of the bureau of engraving and printing set about solving the problem of this tremendous waste about a year ago. He saw that Uncle Sam didn't have money to burn, but a lot of it he could launder. So now his sister, Aunt Samantha, is kept busy at the wash tub.
 Paper can't be scrubbed, so the notes are put on wire trays, which

CAN'T GET TRAINS UNTIL SPRING

Trough passenger service by the Milwaukee with its fast trains will not begin until about next April, according to present plans. The manufacturers have been so busy they could not fill the orders for cars and they will not be ready before spring now.

The company has just purchased 9,000 tons of steel rails to complete the branches being built in this state. These will be laid at once, on the Enumclaw branch and on the Everett and Moncton line.

This shipment amounted to 40,000 more crates than last year. In addition to the raspberries tons of strawberries, blackberries and other valley produce went out.


