CHARGE MILK SALE FROM SICK COWS

TACOMA DAIRIES NOT PROPERLY INSPECTED?

Ordinance Up for Consideration Which Does Not Protect the Parents of Babies.

"I know of one instance where a cow died with tuberculosis and when opened a frightful condition of corruption and disease was developed and yet milk from that cow was delivered to the people of Tacoma within two weeks of the time she died."—Dr. W. D. Garratt.

Is Tacoma getting competent milk and dairy inspection?

The graduate veterinarians of the city say no. They are demanding in the new ordinance that has been prepared and is now in the hands of Mayor Fawcett that provision shall be made for better inspection at the source of the milk supply—the cow.

Dr. Rhodes, the present milk and dairy inspector, has had prepared a new milk ordinance. It provides for delivering milk in bottles, for cleanliness in dairies and for clean milk generally and provides for an inspection to enforce the provisions of the law, but the crux of the thing, according to the graduate veterinarians is that it does not provide for competent inspection by requiring the inspector to be a duly licensed vet.

SOMERACE IN OHIO

(By United Press Leased Wire.) COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—The campaign in Ohio is running full speed today, and will only close with the dawn of election day. Both Warren G. Harding, republican candidate for governor, and Judson Harmon, present incumbent, his democratic opponent, are campaigning today. Harding will close his campaign tonight in Marion. Harmon will make his last speech in Toledo, the city in which Theodore Roosevelt launched his attack against the Ohio executive. It is believed that no eleventh hour attacks are planned, but a strenuous answer to some of the charges made by Roosevelt may be made in Toledo. Both candidates are confident today. Harding claims a plurality of 30,000, and Harmon expects to be returned winner by 50,000.

DR. COOK TO SHOW HIS PROOFS

Rev. H. H. Clapham, who recently resigned his pastorate here in the Trinity Episcopal church, where he had been rector for 13 years, to accept one in Santa Clara, Cal., dropped dead in the pulpit yesterday while preaching his first sermon in the new charge.

START WORK ON DOCK IN MONTH

The sinking fund commission met this afternoon and formally took action calling for bids for the \$405,000 of municipal dock bonds. The advertisement will be started at once, and in 30 days the bonds will be sold. The city will in the meantime finish the plans for remodeling the old warehouse into a modern dock and will get the lumber on the ground.

EXECUTION OF DR. CRIPPEN POSTPONED

(By United Press Leased Wire.) OGDON, Nov. 7.—The execution of Dr. H. H. Crippen, murderer of his wife, was postponed indefinitely today. The order of postponement indicated that Crippen would be brought to the gallows probably on November 22. Crippen originally was sentenced to be hanged tomorrow at Bentonville prison.

15 KILLED IN BLACK DIAMOND EXPLOSION

(By United Press Leased Wire.) BLACK DIAMOND, Wn., Nov. 7.—Fifteen men are entombed in the deepest slope of the Lawson coal mine here today and all hope of their rescue has been abandoned. The men were caught in the mine when a terrific explosion closed all entries to the levels yesterday morning. The property, valued at a quarter of a million dollars, is destroyed. The Pacific Coast Coal company officials are at a loss to understand the cause of the disaster. At 6 o'clock yesterday morning the night fire boss, John Van, came to the surface and reported "all well below."

NO VERDICT IN MRS. KERSH CASE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—After being out since noon Saturday, the jury before which Mrs. Carrie Kersh was tried for complicity in the murder of William A. Johnson at the New Grand Central hotel, was discharged this forenoon by Judge Morrow of the circuit court because no verdict could be arrived at. When the jury reported a disagreement Mrs. Kersh, who was in the courtroom, became hysterical. Shrieking wildly she was taken into the corridor, where she collapsed and a physician had to be called.

New York Strike Grows Serious

LABOR LEADERS CALL OUT TAXICAB DRIVERS AND THREATEN TO CUT OFF COAL SUPPLY NEXT. (By United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The forerunner of what is expected to prove the greatest traffic strike in the history of New York came today, when 1,000 taxicab drivers walked out in sympathy with the union employees of the various companies. The executive council of the unions affiliated with the international Brotherhood of Teamsters was in session today, and the sentiment was to force industrial peace immediately by tying up every wheel in New York and vicinity. GOMPERS TO TAKE CHARGE. President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor is here to take personal direction of the fight. He said today that following the taxicab drivers other drivers of passenger vehicles had been ordered to be in readiness to go out.

TRAINMEN KILLED

SPOKANE, Nov. 7.—The list of eight known dead and four injured in the head-on collision between two freight trains near Chattaroy, 21 miles from Spokane, on the Great Northern, yesterday has not been added to, according to reports from the scene early today. Practically every trainman on the front end of the two trains was killed. Three bodies have not been recovered. The known dead are: JOE KEEF, conductor train No. 451; body unrecovered. H. L. HEPBURN, engineer No. 451; body recovered. JOHN BLANCHARD, fireman, No. 451; body recovered. ALLEN GLASS, engineer Apple Special; body unrecovered. TWO UNIDENTIFIED BOYS, on No. 451; bodies badly burned.

FREIGHT AEROPLANE FLIES 52 MILES

(By United Press Leased Wire.) COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 7.—The first "freight" aeroplane ever flown arrived in Columbus at 11:50 o'clock today, carrying a consignment of silk from a Dayton firm. The machine, driven by Aviator Parmale of the Wright hangars, left Dayton, 52 miles from here, at 10:40 a. m.

PART HOLIDAY TOMORROW

THREE POISONED WITH WINE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 7.—Three Frenchmen, named Louis Fakarany, Henri Cochet and Emil Delandier, all laborers residing in Eighth avenue, were poisoned through drinking from a bottle of port wine containing strychnine today. Fakarany dropped down dead in a drug store while an emetic was being prepared, and the others are now in the General hospital in a serious condition. Another man named John Dejan, who was in company with the poison victims, has mysteriously disappeared, and the police are looking for him as they believe that he may be connected with the affair.

"SILENT VOTE" MAY UPSET OUTLOOK

(By United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—"John A. Dix will be elected governor of New York by 100,000 votes," asserted Chairman Huppach of the democratic state central committee today. "Henry I. Stimson will win by a plurality of 110,000," said Republican Chairman Prentice. Charles R. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, this afternoon estimated the plurality of Dix at 125,000.

Independent Spirit Has Politicians Guessing As To Which Way the Ballots Will Flow.

(By United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Although the politicians of the country are keeping up a show of activity today, the campaign has virtually ended. Energies are devoted to final perfection of plans to "get out the vote." The biggest factor in the eastern vote, is the "silent" vote. Never in the history of the country has it been more difficult to accurately forecast the outcome of an election.

Democrats Gloomy Over the Idaho Outlook

(By United Press Leased Wire.) BOISE, Ida., Nov. 7.—With only the outcome of the gubernatorial contest reasonably doubtful, democratic leaders today admitted that the prospects for democratic success tomorrow in Idaho, were exceedingly gloomy. The campaign which came to a final ending today has been peppy, and the various candidates have stumped the state from border to border.

Democracy's Little Interest Has Been Taken in the Congressional Conventions and Republican Committees Assert that with Idaho's normal republican majority of 17,000 considered, there is little doubt that Burton L. French, progressive republican, will be elected to congress over his democratic opponent, Arthur Bowen.

Chief interest in the election centers about the governorship. Gov. James Brady, republican, is out for re-election, and is opposed by James H. Hawley, democrat. Both sides lay claim to victory by (Continued on Page Eight.)
