WHAT THE BOYS BE A' DOIN' DOWN TO THE LEGISLATUR'

Nothing Sensational On Tap; Many Jokes Being Passed About Between the Members.

(By United Press Leased Wire.) OLYMPIA, Feb. 8.—Victor Zednick will introduce in a few days a bill to abolish party lines in all county and state elections. Zednick also plans to wipe out the double contest in the non-partisan superior court elections. One election and reduced cost of running for office, is the young King county man's slogan.

WANT A SENATOR FROM EACH COUNTY

Arguing that state representation should follow the system in vogue in the national government, Senators Espy and Anderson submitted a plan of apportionment providing for a senator from each county and representatives according to population. The senate, however, rejected the bill by a vote of 24 to 17 yesterday.

HERE'S ONE OF THE "JOKES" THEY PASSED

One argument advanced against the bill of Senators Espy and Anderson facetiously stated that to do so would mean that Senator Stevenson of Astoria, Columbia and Garfield counties, would have to represent only one of them, and that he was too big a man for that. Senator Stevenson promptly replied: "I knew I was against the bill for some reason, I didn't know what it was, and I am glad someone was good enough to tell me."

ONE DOLLAR A DAY FOR WITNESS IN JAIL

Witnesses detained in jail will hereafter be compensated at the rate of \$1 a day, and the regular witness fees for the days that they actually spend in court attendance, according to a bill.

passed in the house yesterday. There was no legal authority in the past to pay such witnesses anything during their term of detention.

DIRECT ELECTION OF SENATORS DEMANDED

Five emocrats yesterday had similar bills introduced to both houses to provide for the Oregon method of selecting U. S. senators. Senators Troy, Chappell, Jensen and White had the measure submitted to the senate, while Hugh Todd introduced it in the house. It provides that a contest between the regular nominees at the primaries be held and that candidates for the legislature may pledge themselves to vote for the "people's choice." All those so pledging themselves will have such fact recorded beside their names on the official ballot.

ANOTHER COMPENSATION MEETING SCHEDULED

One more public meeting will be held in the house tonight under the auspices of the joint labor committees of the legislature, for the purpose of discussing the compensation act. Three previous meetings of this character have brought out some of the biggest crowds of the present session. Both employers and laboring men make addresses.

PIPER WORRIES OVER "INSANE" METHODS

Senator Piper got another chance yesterday to deplore the departure of "safe and sane" days in the legislature, when the bill to give each county a senator came up. "Even the 'pops' weren't radical enough to introduce such a tendency, according to a bill," he complained.

SCHWAB TO BUILD HUGE COKE PLANT

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, Feb. 8.—Charles M. Schwab today announced here that he will build in Berlin a coke plant costing \$5,000,000, which is to supply the Bethlehem Steel works. German capital will assist.

Schwab declared himself in favor of the new Canadian reciprocity plan. "The senate," he said, "is bound to ratify the treaty. The bargain seems fair on both sides."

\$750,000 LOSS FROM OIL FIRE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) RICHMOND, Cal., Feb. 8.—An oil plant, known as the Aceto plant, in the heart of the great Standard Oil refineries here, are in ruins today with a loss estimated at \$750,000, as the result of an explosion. Four men were badly burned while fighting the flames and for a time the whole 15 acres of the works were imperiled.

Sparks from the smokestacks of the furnace building started the fire and when it reached a tank of sulphuric acid in the buildings, an explosion came which shook the city. For a time tanks containing 500,000 gallons of oil were in danger.

Patsy Mathison, a bartender, proceeded to have rough house at his home yesterday, and his wife called for the police. When Jailer Murphy appeared Mathison defied him. There was a short and decisive battle, and Patsy was landed.

Four prisoners were taken from the county jail to Walla Walla today. They are Edward Van, G. W. Moran, Jake Van Burke and K. Yoshida.

The jury returned a verdict of \$275 for Oliver Malcolm in his suit against the T. R. & P., resulting from the Alki blockade.

FINDS MEXICO ALIVE WITH INSURGENTS

The lamp knocked the elder Shields unconscious and covered him with burning oil. He died in a hospital several hours later.

Europe Faces Hard Fight With Anarchy

(By United Press Leased Wire.) ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 8.—Europe is on the eve of a desperate struggle with anarchy, according to high officials of the Russian police today, who say their agents have warned them of trouble in the near future. Even England, they say, realizes the situation and the bill to be introduced in parliament providing for the exclusion of undesirable from England is the best evidence of the official attitude.

The arrest in Budapest of Dr. Peter Sarafinoff of Moscow, for a plot to kill Czar Nicholas, the breaking up of a Charlottenburg conspiracy to assassinate the Kaiser, the renewal of bomb outrages at Barcelona, Spain, and the activity of anarchists in France and Italy, the police say, all point to a renewal of the terrorist activity. The police predict a perfect epidemic of anarchist plots and outrages during the coming summer.


