A claim of \$1,000 brought against the state of California by A. G. Lafferty of Humboldt county for supplies furnished during the Indian wars in 1851 is soon to be paid, a bill providing for the payment having just been passed by the legislature.

A game rooster flew to the top of one of the passenger coaches of a train on the Baltimore & Ohio railroad at Brownsville, Md., and stayed on the roof of the car until the train reached Waverton.

Harold Rockwell, 13 years old, of Providence, R. I., made a violin in his spare time after school hours from wood obtained from old cigar boxes and he has just sold the instrument to a connoisseur for \$50.

INDIAN BOY IS BADLY BURNED

Chester Charlie, aged 6, a little Indian boy, is in the county hospital and his father, Louie Charlie, and wife, are in the city jail getting over a big drunk. Little Chester, with two other small children, was brought to town from Puyallup by their parents Tuesday. The parents started out on a drunk, dragging the children along. At night they camped in the open at the head of the bay. Little Chester was awakened by his trousers catching fire and one leg was badly burned before he could get the fire out. His parents were too drunk to even notice him.

For 30 hours they dragged the little fellow around town with that burned leg until officers finally picked up the outfit and examined the boy to see what was the matter. Terrible burns were discovered and he was sent to the hospital and his parents locked up.

SMALLPOX

Look out for smallpox! This warning is sounded by the health officers to Tacoma people, especially to proprietors of lodging houses.

There are eight cases of smallpox on lower Pacific avenue and these are all that have been discovered by the health officers. Dr. Brown believes these cases were all caused by one man who wandered about different lodging houses for a week before the disease was discovered.




