## GIRL LOST FOR 62 DAYS

MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE OF DOROTHY ARNOLD, NEW YORK HEIRRESS, MAY NEVER BE SOLVED.

It was just sixty-two days ago today that Dorothy Arnold, the only daughter of a New York millionaire, disappeared as completely as if the earth had swallowed her.

Where is Dorothy Arnold? She had youth, beauty, plenty of money and a position in life—yet she either sought oblivion of her own will or has been foully dealt with.

Whole World Follows Case. She has been reported found in every quarter of the globe. Day after day the news wires have carried stories of new clues. A small army of paid detectives have followed every thread of the tangled skein of mystery—but Dorothy Arnold is still missing. Today her father told the newspaper men that he believes his daughter is dead. The detectives have been dismissed.

Last Seen on Fifth Ave. On a bright winter afternoon, while Christmas shoppers were hurrying from shop to shop, Dorothy Arnold walked into a bookstore on Fashionable Fifth avenue, bought a novel, later bought a half-pound box of chocolates, and greeted a girl friend as she walked down the crowded avenue. She has never been seen since.

Did she elope with some man of whom her parents knew nothing? Did she run away to Italy to join her mother who has been separated from her father? Did she seek surcease from the intoxicating whirl of society in some quiet convent? Was she enticed to the den of a white slaver and there sold into awful bondage? Was she lured to some dark alley and then murdered for the small sum of money she carried in her purse? Did she lose her reason and is now confined in some asylum as an unknown? Did she enter the ranks of the chorus girls under some hastily assumed name and frail disguise? All of these questions have been put to the detective squad and there has been a negative answer to all. Only time will solve the mystery. Or, as in the case of little Charley Ross, will the mystery of Dorothy Arnold remain another unfathomable enigma of a great city?

C., Feb. 22.—When Justice Gregory in the superior court yesterday afternoon handed down a decision de-throning Victoria's mayor, it was supposed the same decision carried an order to unseat all the aldermen, but a careful examination reveals the fact that as there is a similar petition in court against the aldermen there was no action taken in their case, and they are now wondering where they stand.
