Labor Leader State Commissioner

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—For the first time in the history of California politics a labor union man has been appointed State Labor Commissioner. Heretofore the holders of this office have been allied with capital.

The recent appointment by Gov. Johnson of John P. McLaughlin, labor leader, shows the new order of things in California politics. It shows how the insurgent administration is trying to fill offices with men who are best fitted to hold them.

"Looking at the laws from the standpoint of a trade unionist, I am not satisfied that they have been enforced for the benefit of the great majority of the people," declared McLaughlin when he took office. So he is going to see the laws enforced.

"Big Business" doesn't like this new commissioner, because he promises trouble for many who have been violating labor and sanitary laws. In the past the laws have not been enforced. But this will soon stop, as many other things have stopped since insurgency kicked the railroad octopus out of politics.
