

## ENGLISH PEOPLE CLAIM THEY ARE TAXED TOO HIGH

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, April 17.—Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd George expected to be highly complimented on having come out \$25,430,020 ahead on his book-keeping for the past fiscal year. Instead of that, he is being severely criticized for it. The popular argument is that he has that extra money because he taxed the people more heavily than was necessary. And the taxpayers assert that they would rather have the money in their own pockets than in the national treasury. The chancellor replies that there will be plenty of uses for the surplus funds in paying off old debts and making social improvements. Nevertheless there is a good deal of dissatisfaction.

## WANTS JAPS BARRED TODAY IN HISTORY

(By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., April 17.—Exclusion from the United States of Japanese, Koreans and Hindus, and all other Asiatics on the same basis as that now applicable to Chinese, is provided for in a resolution introduced in the house today by Representative Hayes. Speaking to his resolution, Hayes declared that the constant influx of Japanese, Hindus and other Asiatic laborers into the Pacific coast states is a menace to the standard of living of American workmen. Exclusion from the seven original confederate states for two reasons, one of which was that the north was the best buyer of Virginia tobacco, and the second that the confederate states were not as staunch as they might be in the assurance that slavery was to be perpetuated under the confederacy anyway. But finally Virginia cast her lot with the Tarheels and Crackers to the south rather than to the Wooden Nutmeg vendors and Pennsylvania Dutch at the north and left.

## Lovers Will Defy Blackhand Threat

CHICAGO, April 17.—Love, which laughs at locksmits, will also smirk at black handers on April 26, when Miss Minnie Vuneo, daughter of one of Chicago's wealthiest Italians, will wed Dr. Frederick Wetterer, despite the fact that members of the black hand society have threatened to kill her, her father and the bridegroom at the altar.

## Noted Bandit is Pardoned

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 17.—Chris Evans, the noted bandit and train robber, will be freed May 1. His order for parole from Pulson penitentiary, where he has been serving 12 years of a life sentence, was made last night by the state board of prison directors. Evans' failing health prompted the parole.

## TURKEY FACES A REBELLION

(By United Press Leased Wire.) CONSTANTINOPLE, April 17.—General Turgut Pasha, in command of the Turkish troops in the field against the Albanian rebels, is said to have reported confidentially to War Minister Chetkek Pasha that the government has a long, hard campaign ahead of it, and that he will need a much larger force than at present to restore order.


## May Limit Height of Buildings.
