



Cynthia Grey's Letters

Dear Miss Grey:— How can I clean a white straw sailor hat?—Constant Reader.

A.:—A method which is usually successful is this: Dampen white cornmeal and scour hat with it, using stiff-bristled nail-brush. If hat is badly soiled, repeat process several times. Finally apply fresh meal and allow it to dry on the straw. When perfectly dry, brush off and hat will look like new.

Dear Miss Grey:— (1) How does one carry olives to the mouth? (2) My cousin has been married for some time, but I've not met her husband. Shall I kiss him when we meet? (3) When I am at the theater with a friend, am I supposed to hold his hat?—A Friend.

A.: (1) With the fingers. (2) Not at all necessary. (3) No, indeed!

Dear Miss Grey:— How can I clean a Panama hat?—Mrs. J. V.

A.: Use small hand scrubbing brush, the best white laundry soap and lukewarm water. Scour until hat is clean, then rinse thoroughly. Dry in shady place, in breeze if possible. As hat is drying, keep in shape with the hands, as it's apt to draw out of shape. A good plan is to dry it over an inverted dish of the same shape as crown.

Dear Miss Grey:— I would like a recipe for hulled corn.—A Reader.

A.: Half fill a large kettle with wood ashes, then nearly fill with water and boil 10 minutes. Drain off the lye, throw away the ashes, rinse kettle and put lye back into kettle. Put in 4 quarts shelled corn and boil until the hull will rub off. Then put into tub and pour over it a gallon of cold water. Scrub with clean new broom. As the water thickens, pour off and add clean cold water. Put through 4 waters, then take out and rub between hands. Pick out the hulls and put corn on to cook in cold water. When half done, pour of the hot water, and renew with cold. Do not salt until cooked tender, a very careful not to burn.

Dear Miss Grey:— What will remove axle grease from tan broadcloth.—X. X.

A.: Sponge with chloroform.

Dear Miss Grey:— Please give recipe for sunshine cake.—A Reader.

A.: Use angel food recipe, substituting orange extract for vanilla and adding the well-beaten yolks of 6 eggs to the beaten whites and sugar before adding the flour.

Dear Miss Grey:— I am 17. Do you think I am too young to keep steady company if my parents approve?—Midge.

A.: No. Your parents are your best advisers, always.

HELP CHILDREN TO HELP THEMSELVES

As, up to school age, a child is constantly with the mother or some older person, it follows that the early occupations take the form of "helping" or of imitating the mother's work. The "help" if often a hindrance, but to inculcate the spirit of helpfulness, at an early age, it is worth all the trouble. One boy of two years breaks macaroni for his mother, shells peas, strings beans, and carries things to their places about the house. Another child, a girl, had at the age of five made a patchwork quilt for her doll's cradle, and could plan, cut and make work bags and simple doll's dresses. At four, one little girl was a famous little cook, making junket, cup custards, gelatine desserts and apple pudding; she could also prepare cereals, stewed fruit and vegetables. When seven years old she followed any ordinary recipes, her favorite kitchen book being "When Mother Lets Us Cook," by Constance Johnson. Her course in domestic science went still further, as she was doing the family laundry for her dolls, using starch and bluing with good results, and having her own line, basket and clothes pins, as well as small irons and an ironing board. It is well to provide a child, by the time he is five, with a little chair and either a table or desk at which he may sit to carry on many of the occupations which interest him.

James Dingwall and Thomas Bowers, two of the men, have passed away, and Robert Carr, an engineer, could not be in Duluth. The other men are William Ewen, Thomas Sandeland and Jacob Zimmerman, who died April 7. The six men came to Duluth together on the steamer Keweenaw, an old sidewheel boat.
