HARRIMAN WILL DEFEND CONNERS AND MAPLE TOO

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, May 31.—The attorneys engaged by the ironworkers' union to conduct the defense of the McNamara brothers will also look after the interests of B. H. Conners and A. B. Maple, indicted by the grand jury in connection with the attempt to dynamite the Hall of Records building here last September. This fact became known through a visit of Attorney Job Harriman to the cells of Conners and Maple. Chief Deputy District Attorney Horton declared today that Conners and Maple would probably be tried before the McNamara brothers. Clarence Darrow, chief counsel for the McNamaras, will leave this afternoon for San Francisco to confer with labor leaders there.

Australia Will Not Stand for Japanese

MELBOURNE, May 31.—Strained relations between Japan and Australia is predicted here today, following the publication of an article in the Sydney Telegraph, written by William Morris Hughes, acting premier of the commonwealth, concerning Japanese immigration to which he is opposed. "Australia will never agree except at sword points to admit Japanese immigrants to Australia, even if such refusal means separation from either country," declared Hughes. Hughes' sentiments are taken to reflect the sentiments of the majority of citizens of Australia on the matter.

Tobacco Stock Takes Slump

(By United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, May 31.—The curb market today showed the effect of the supreme court decision in the tobacco trust case. Though there was little variation at the opening and the prices at first held close to Monday's final figures, both in American Tobacco and Standard Oil securities, there was a decided slump within the first half-hour. On sales of \$60 shares of American Tobacco that stock dropped to 450 bid, 460 asked, as against 510 bid and 515 asked at Monday's close.

HIDEOUS TRAGEDIES OF THE MAINE EXPLOSION ABOUT TO BE REVEALED


HAVANA, Cuba, May 31.—The search of the exposed wreck of the battleship Maine may reveal some hideous tragedies of that last moment of despair. Many were the terrible tales told by the few survivors. This story of the death of Frank Gardner, coal passer on the Maine, was told the court of inquiry by Fireman William Gartell: "I had a mattress in the steam steering room and I was lying down there to sleep. Frank Gardner, coal passer, was lying down beside me. Just as soon as I laid down I was talking to him, and I hadn't spoken three words. He was telling me his time was out in June, and he made the remark that he was going to wait for me—all like that, just fooling. And just then a flash came. I could see through the door, sir. It was kind of a blue flame and it all came at once. The two of us jumped up, and I went on the port side up the engine room ladder, and Frank Gardner, he went up the starboard side at least, he didn't go up, because he struck the door right there where the partition separates the two doors. Everything was dark. "He must have struck his head. He hollered to me: 'Oh, Jesus, Billy, I am gone.' I didn't stop then, because the water was up to my knees. "I made a break as quick as I could up the ladder, and when I got up into the steerage room the ladder there was gone. I couldn't see anything. And I gave up, or started to. There was a colored fellow with me. I didn't know his name until afterwards. His name was Harris. We got hold of each other. "I said: 'let's give up—there's no hope.' I started in to say a

prayer the best I knew how. Then I heard a voice. It was an officer, because he said: 'There is hope, men.' "Then I saw a little light. I made for it and it seemed like I could see the heavens overhead. I got jammed in the ladder—my head right up against the deck. I caught hold of Harris, and the two of us hugged together. "I don't know whether I got out first, or this colored fellow, but when I did get out and looked where I was and saw the heavens and everything, I tried to say a prayer or something, and I fainted away. Then somebody picked me up and threw me overboard."
