COUNCIL STANDS PAT ON PETTIT ORDINANCE

DELEGATION OF BUSINESS MEN PROTEST AGAINST POLICE BILL — SEYMOUR STANDS SQUARELY WITH OTHER COMMISSIONERS.

"Look out, you will hurt business!" That was the cry of 150 business men who descended on the city commission yesterday afternoon to protest against the new liquor ordinance of Commissioner Pettit.

It got very warm. Stephen Appleby, Sam Andrews, J. C. Heitman, Orville Billings, W. B. Coffee, Henry Mohr, A. H. Barnhise, A. R. Titlow and others spoke.

Every man had a different kick. Appleby was against the anti-trade, saying it was laughed at in Paris.

Titlow wants to sell liquor in his new hotel and he kicked on the hotel clause of the Pettit ordinance, as did several others also. Titlow also came out for a restricted district.

Wanted a District. Pettit asked him how the city could have a restricted district under the state law and Titlow was stumped. He wanted one anyway.

Mayor Seymour here spoke up spiritedly.

"I want to say now that the Globe hotel will never reopen while I am mayor," he said. "Further I take issue with the statement that a restricted district is the way to handle this problem. The committee of 15 of New York after visiting every large city in the country unanimously declared against the restricted district. From some other way, I will quit the mayor's chair before I'll stand for a restricted district."

Pettit said he was trying to protect the boys and girls of the city.

Henry Mohr said the schools and parks were worse than the saloons in ruining boys and girls.

This brought a protest from Mayor Seymour and an apology from W. B. Coffee. Coffee said the police should watch the back doors of the saloons. He said his store was located where he could see the boys and girls going into a saloon in the back door.

Titlow wanted the saloons and vice centers all put in the back so no one would see them.

J. C. Heitman kicked on the idea of getting the signature of the owner of the property before a license would be granted for a saloon. He also protested against anything that would bother tourists coming here when they wanted to get a drink in restaurants. Several citizens rung the changes on the tourist question, deprecating any legislation that might prevent the tourist from wetting his whistle.

Sam Andrews also wanted it left so he could take his family and get liquor with his meals.

Orville Billings said the trouble with children going wrong is the parents. He said if they were going wrong they would go anyway. On the Pettit ordinance he was against the "whole blooming thing."

Want It All Dropped. The mayor kept trying to get at just what the crowd objected to and the leaders of the crowd kept suggesting that it would be a good idea to drop the whole thing.

The mayor scouted this notion. He made it clear that an ordinance would be passed and the saloons regulated but he declared if there was anything unreasonable in the ordinance the council would gladly take it out.

There was a lot of talk by various members of the crowd about freak laws and hurting business and Tom Fleetwood went so far as to say business men had given notice they would withdraw \$1,000 subscriptions for the carnival if the ordinance passed. Orville Billings even said the Tacoma hotel would probably close.

"We have done everything we could to help the carnival but we do not propose to sacrifice the welfare of the city for years to come for a carnival," said the mayor.

For Men Before Dollars. "No, and I am free to say that I am for humanity before the dollar," said Pettit.

Assistant City Attorney Baker finally came in smiling and pointed out that the whole thing was a case of much ado about nothing, for the new ordinance is simply getting together all the old ones and the state laws and incorporating them in one law.

"We are trying to make an ordinance now that is legal," said Baker, "and that we can enforce. That is all there is to it."

Then the business men appointed A. R. Titlow, James H. Dege, A. H. Barnhise, W. B. Coffee and E. F. Gregory a committee to take the matter up.

The ordinance is being rewritten and will be ready next Tuesday night. At this time a public hearing will be held on it and some of the other side may be present.

STRIKE TIES UP BIG STEAMERS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SOUTHAMPTON, Eng., June 10.—The giant liner St. Paul of the American line was unable to sail today owing to the strike of coal passers. The ranks of the strikers were augmented today and shipping here is virtually tied up. The new liner Olympic will probably be unable to start on her maiden voyage next week. The companies are frantically endeavoring to employ non-union coal passers. Unless some settlement is reached, the coronation naval review will be affected.

He said he would prefer to have the wool schedule revised in accordance with definite information from the tariff board, but that he would accept the present revision rather than none.


