LABOR HATER OTIS WANTS MILLION OF OUR MONEY

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 12.—Gen. Harrison Gray Otis is in Washington this week. Congress will be asked for another million-dollar appropriation to be used in diking the Colorado river below the United States line in Mexico.

Otis is one of the chief men in a huge land company which owns practically all the rich lands in Mexico threatened by the breaks. Last year an emergency appropriation was made of an even million dollars to close a break. When the army engineers in charge of Col. J. A. Ockerson were ready to go to work, Diaz refused to let them operate.
